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ORVILLE CROW'S BAD EXPERIENCE WITH BROKEN LEG

Lay in Road Five Hours Before Help Came. Limb Swelling Badly Meanwhile

PYBURN TOUCHE FOR \$180 AT HOTEL

First Snow Appears At Bohemia Mines and Now Two Feet Deep Basketball Team

Orville Crow, who lives about one mile east of Lorane, met with a serious accident Thursday morning, and he can thank a good pair of lungs for his rescue. He was going to his work on horseback about 5:30 and as he is customary with him when horseback riding, it is said, galloped his horse down hill, which this time proved very unfortunate for him as the animal stumbled and fell, throwing Mr. Crow over his head to the ground, the fall breaking his left leg. He attempted to reach his horse, which stood browsing a short distance away, but could not move, and the pain became almost unbearable. It was scarcely light enough to see and there was no hope of anyone coming along the road for some hours. Mr. Crow set up a yell that echoed and re-echoed for a long distance, but it was 10 o'clock before his cry of distress reached the ears of W. W. Jackson, postmaster and merchant of Lorane, over a mile distant, and he went to the aid of the unfortunate man, who was removed to the home of his father at Lorane, and Dr. Job sent for. The doctor reached the injured man about 12 o'clock and found him suffering great pain and the limb badly swollen, but he soon made him easy and set the leg.

Touched for \$180.
A man named Pyburn, who hails from the wilds of Idaho, was relieved of \$180 in cash at the Thompson hotel at Cottage Grove last Wednesday night, and if Pyburn's story can be relied on, like Ritchey, of this city, is the man who lifted the Idahoan's wallet. According to the story told by Pyburn and Ritchey had been together for much of all day Wednesday, and frequently "hit" a bottle the two carried in a convenient pocket, for he knows that Cottage Grove is "dry"—unless you want a drink. Along about 8:30 in the evening the two went to the hotel and to a room where it is said Pyburn took a "night cap," and soon after his money took a walk, as also did Ritchey. He has been accused of the theft, but denies the soft impeachment, though he is said to have admitted taking Pyburn's knife and corn-cob pipe, which were returned. Unless the accused man squeals upon himself today, Officer Snodgrass will make charges against him and have him held for examination. A man with \$180 in his pockets ought to have sense enough to refrain from "blind pig" booze.

Will Set Out Orchard.
Colonel Blair, of the Hotel Oregon, who recently acquired 60 acres of fine fruit land in the southern suburbs of Cottage Grove, on Fourth street, a part of the Spray place, has men at work plowing thirty acres, which will be set out orchard this fall, five acres to English walnuts and five acres to Combe pears, which will make a total of fifteen acres set out to fruit, five acres of winter apples having been planted by Mr. Spray before he sold his tract to Colonel Blair. Next fall another ten or twenty acres will be set out to walnuts, and other fruit trees, by Mr. Blair, and he will soon have one of the best young orchards in this vicinity, the tract comprising a slight east and south slope, being ideal for any kind of fruit.

Basketball Team.
The members of the old Cottage Blues reorganized this week and will commence with regular practice in the armory soon. They have just received fine regulation basketball suits and have their baskets up and ball now for the season. The line-up for the team this year is as follows: Right forward, Bob Sherwood; left forward, Allen Baker (captain); center, Elmer Hastings; left guard, Fay Allison; right guard, Chester Baker; substitute, Charles Beals; manager, Mertin Earle. This team has played together with much success for the past two years.

Had a Close Call.
G. G. Warren returned to this city from the Bohemia mining camp on Tuesday, where he has spent the summer developing his mining properties. He says the first sign of snow was seen at Bohemia last week and is now about two feet deep in the higher altitudes. A great deal of development work was accomplished in the camp this season, and one new reduction plant was put in. Indications point to an active season next year, when some of the mines will certainly become actual workings—Western Oregon and Idaho.
