CLOSING WEEK OF NATIONAL CAMPAIGN TO BE ONE OF HARD STRAIN

New York, Oct. 26.—With election day little more than a week away, the leaders of all political parties today started out on the final effort of what is expected to be a sensational finish to the national campaign. New York is the real battleground in the opinion of the campaign managers, and here today were gathered practically all the heavy artillery of both parties.

Bryan's schedule for today includes speeches in half a dozen towns and a long formal address at a big mass meeting in Madison Square Garden this evening.

Taft has a mid-day engagement at New Haven, but will return to New York this afternoon and deliver several addresses before midnight. He will devote the entire week to New York.

Of the other states the greatest activity is in Ohio and Indiana. Vice President Fairbanks and John W. Kern, Democratic candidate for the vice presidency, are the leading speakers in Indiana, and in Ohio several of President Roosevelt's cabinet will speak for Taft.

GOMPERS REPLIES TO ROOSEVELT'S LETTER TO KNOX

Leader of American Federation of Labor States His Case

Washington, D. C., Oct. 26.—Replying to President Roosevelt's letter to Senator Knox in reference to the application of the writ of injunction in labor disputes, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in a statement issued today, severely arraigns the president for what he terms a "change of position of at least apparent friendship to labor, infatigable antagonism."

In opening his statement Mr. Gompers declares that although he has often in the past discussed with the president fundamental questions of right, justice and moral right, he

FROZEN TO DEATH IN MOUNTAINS AT WALDO LAKE

Earl Dodd Becomes Lost While Out Hunting and Meets Untimely Death

BODY FOUND BY HIS COMPANIONS SATURDAY

Was Employed on Black's Irrigation Reservoir—Body to Be Brought Here

Earl Dodd, aged 26 years, son of W. S. Dodd, who resides near Natron, was found dead near Waldo Lake Saturday morning.

The news of the finding of the body reached Eugene Sunday evening by telephone from Lowell. The message came to Coroner Gordon. A messenger was sent out from Waldo Lake to find the body. The search party on the road, passed the State ranch a few miles further down the road, where a phone message was sent to Lowell and it was repeated there to the coroner.

Permission was wanted from the coroner to remove the body. The coroner gave the permission and decided that the body should be brought out and he would meet it at Waldo Lake.

Few particulars of the death of the young man were obtained from the message. He was engaged in work with J. F. Gold, John Krugus and Dick Hingle on A. R. Black's irrigation reservoir project at the lake.

Thursday morning he left the camp with his rifle with the intention of killing some game. He did not return until about 10 o'clock. He had started out in the morning and continued to search, finding his

body at about 10 o'clock. He had lost his way and came to his death through exposure. There are three feet of snow in the mountains here at this time. The messenger did not state the manner of the young man's death and it might be seen that he had been shot. However, young Dodd was a rough woodsman, and was always careful in the mountains, and his friends can not imagine how he got lost, if he did, but it is surmised that he went further away from camp than he intended and darkness came upon him before he realized it, and too late to reach camp that night. Unless he is well sheltered, no man could live through a night there with a trace of protection from the cold at this time of the year.

Waldo Lake is about twenty-five miles from the lake. As there is only one trail leading out from the lake, it will take some time by the time it
