EUGENE NOW HAS FIVE MERGENTHALERS

Albany Herald's Old Machine Has Been Shipped to This City

The Register, of this city, has purchased the Mergenthaler linotype that has been in the office of the Albany Herald for several years past and will add it to its plant. The machine has been for sale for some time past, and it was offered to The Guard as well as the Salem Journal, but the publishers of both papers decided to put in new machines of late models, adding to the equipment of their plants, even if it cost more. The main point of public interest in this transaction is that it shows Albany lacks the enterprise to support a newspaper that can afford to own and operate typesetting machines. In Eugene it is different. The Guard plant is equipped with two machines of the latest models, a No. 5 and a No. 4 (doubledock model). Yoran's job office has a No. 5, and the Register will have two of the older models, which have been in use a number of years, making five Mergenthaler machines in this city. Albany has none. A town is best judged by its newspapers.

SHOULD ALLOW HOUNDS TO RUN IN MOUNTAINS

They Would Run Cougars and Wolves Out and Deer Would Then Be More Numerous

"If the law prohibiting the running of hounds in the mountains, not repealed there will soon be no more deer hunting," was the declaration of Geo. Croner, who kept the Belknap Springs summer resort this year and who has just returned to his home in Eugene. He states that the cougars and wolves are becoming so numerous that they are either killing all the deer off or are running them out of the mountains. The cougars and wolves are becoming very bold and are increasing rapidly. During the last two or three years the deer have grown perceptibly scarcer. If hounds were allowed to run in the mountains, Mr. Croner says, they would frighten away the wolves and cougars and the deer would be as plentiful as before. Hounds, he says, do not kill the deer, but run them into the rivers, where they are safe. On the other hand, when the varmints hear the baying of the hounds and the barking of dogs they never linger, but take to the high mountains, as they are in deadly fear of the animals.

Mr. Croner had a very successful year at the Springs this year—in fact this was the most successful year in the history of the resort. At one time there were 69 camps on the grounds. The fishing was good, but the hunting was poor, for the reason as stated at the beginning of this article.

RENO WIDE OPEN GAMBLING TOWN

Reno, Nev., Oct. 24.—Reno will remain a wide-open town for some time to come, according to the result of the city election held here today, when the gambling element won by a majority of 566 votes out of a total of about 2100 votes cast. The election was on a city ordinance to forbid the running of gambling games under license in the city of Reno. The ordinance was put to the city vote upon petition of the Anti-Gambling League, who made a red-hot fight at the polls.

Reno, Nev., Oct. 24.—Word comes from New York today that William Randolph Hearst will soon take up his residence in Nevada for a candidate for United States senator in 1910, using this as a step to the presidency.
