## INDIGNANT REPLY OF ARCHIBALD TO CHARGES

Standard Oil Magnate Seeks to Explain Morrison Appointment

New York, Oct. 26.—John D. Archibald, of the Standard Oil Company, made the following statement this afternoon regarding the letters read by W. R. Hearst at the Carnegie Hall meeting Saturday night:

"I am very sure that Mr. Hearst read the letter neither Judge Morrison nor Judge Henderson had any knowledge of my having written Governor Stone in their behalf. Judge Henderson was not appointed by Governor Stone to the supreme court, but was three years later appointed by Governor Pennypacker to the supreme court judgeship. If, however, any feeble word of mine could have influenced in the slightest degree the selection of these gentlemen for their respective positions, I would be very proud of it. Their states have no better servants than they, and I certainly have never asked a favor of them of any kind, either for myself or for the company with which I am connected.

"My letters to General Elkin referring to the accompanying drafts related entirely to contributions to the Republican state committee, then engaged in the campaign preliminary

to the nomination of Mr. McKinley, a subject regarding which I think Mr. Hearst should be a little sensitive, for was it not the election and tragic death of Mr. McKinley that came near costing Mr. Hearst his precious neck? The statement regarding Judge Haight is in connection with an old libel that has been explained and exploded so many times that it would be a simple weariness to the public to go over it again.

"The intimidation by Mr. Hearst that he has had any communication from me or any of my associates in connection with the stolen letters is a lie.

"The only favor which I would ask or hope ever to ask of Hearst is that he return to me the letters handed him by his larcenous gentleman friend which were written from Japan, relating to the fatal illness of my daughter in that country."

**Elkin's Denial**  
New York, Oct. 26.—William J. Bryan spoke in the Astor Gallery at a reception of the Woman's Democratic Club at the Waldorf-Astoria today. Judge Elkin, of the supreme court of Pennsylvania, who up to this time has made only a general denial of improper relations with John D. Archibald and the Standard Oil Company, as inferentially charged by Mr. Hearst through the reading of a number of letters to Mr. Elkin at a political meeting in New York last Saturday night, presented a detailed statement to the Associated Press tonight, explaining the letters and the matters to which they referred.

## CHARGES THAT WERE MADE BY HEARST

New York, Oct. 24.—W. R. Hearst addressed a big meeting here in behalf of the independence party, and during the course of his speech read a letter from John D. Archibald to Governor Stone, of Pennsylvania, urging the appointment of Judge Morrison to the supreme court bench, vice Mitchell, deceased.

Mr. Hearst began by referring to his previous disclosures regarding so-called Standard Oil letters, and in commenting thereon said:

"I have endeavored to show clearly the corruption of the two old parties and the need for a new party. I have endeavored to show the necessity of the measures for which the platform of the independence party stands if the republic is to endure. I consider it my solemn duty to give the citizens of this nation the information I possess.

"I have performed my duty impartially and fearlessly. My disclosures are about at an end, but I have an important batch of letters tonight bearing upon a matter close to the heart of all good citizens.

"The independence party platform declares for election of senators by the people. I have fought for that reform for over 20 years, and I am happy to see that the necessity for it is now universally recognized.

Election of judges also calls for the election of all judges by the people. There are many sincere and patriotic citizens who do not as yet realize the advantage of this plank, but I purpose to show tonight the influences that are exerted whenever opportunity comes to secure the appointment of judges favorable to the Standard Oil interests.

"Before reading these letters I am going to ask my friends in the audience to bid me a fond farewell.

"Information has been delicately conveyed to me that if I stop reading letters right now all will be forgiven, but if I make another damaging disclosure, the whole power of the Standard Oil Company will be exerted against me.

"I say farewell to my friends, therefore, because I am going to read the letters:

**Archibald Letter**  
26 Broadway, December 5, 1902.—My Dear Governor:—I am sure you will pardon any seeming presumption on my part in writing you on a subject which both personally and on behalf of my company I am greatly interested. It is to urge the appointment of Judge Morrison, of McKean, to the supreme bench, vice Mitchell, deceased. Judge Morrison's character for ability and integrity needs no word at my hands, but aside from these great considerations his familiarity with all that pertains to the great industries of oil and gas in the important relation they bear to the interests of the western part of the state, make him especially desirable as a member of the court from that section. Hoping that it may prove possible for you to favorably consider Judge Morrison's appointment I am, with every high regard, sincerely yours,

JOHN D. ARCHIBOLD.  
To Hon. William A. Stone, Harrisburg, Pa.

"I certainly do not intend to attack the judiciary.

**Morrison Appointed**  
"I do not intend to make the slightest comment upon the letter. But I feel at liberty to inform the public that Judge Morrison is today a member of the supreme bench of Pennsylvania, and that he reached that high position either through his ability and integrity, or through his familiarity with oil and gas."

**ROSBURG STORES**

Roseburg, Oct. 26.—For the first time for several months the confectionery and cigar stores and theatres of Roseburg were kept open on Sunday. Shortly after the June election, when the county went dry, the citizens of the wet element, as a means of retaliation against the Prohibitionists, some of whom were engaged in business, caused the Sunday "lid" to be put on Roseburg good and hard. After several violations of the law were arrested and fined everything was closed tight, but when the decision of Judge Gantenbein, of Portland, declaring the law unconstitutional, was learned of the shopkeepers in this city decided to open on Sundays, feeling confident that if it should come to a trial that the supreme court of Oregon will uphold the decision of the Portland judge.
