PARTICULARS OF COTTAGE GROVE'S BIG BLAZE

Loss on Stock of Goods About \$25,000—Mr. Veatch Will Rebuild

The Cottage Grove Leader tells of the big fire there Monday night as follows:

Cottage Grove was visited by quite a destructive fire Monday evening, but which, through the efficiency of the volunteer fire department and our excellent gravity water system, was confined to the two-story brick building being occupied by the Garman-Hemenway Company, located at about the center of Main street in the very heart of the city. The fire was discovered about 9:30 in the evening, soon after the store closed, by Miss "Jimnie" Blair, of the Hotel Oregon, located on the opposite corner, and H. H. Veatch, who was seated in the hotel conversing with a commercial traveler, ran to the city hall nearby and turned in the alarm. By this time the fire, which seemed to have originated in the rear of the building, upstairs, from some unknown cause, had spread to all parts of the building on both floors. The east side fire company responded promptly, as their hose cart was but half a block away, but the west side company encountered the partially torn down bridge on Main street, which is being rebuilt, and was delayed 10 or 15 minutes. As soon as the hose was played on the fire, under the heavy pressure of the water, it had a telling effect, and when the second company got busy it was evident that owing to the still night and the damp condition of the adjoining buildings the fire laddies were being able to keep the fire confined to the big brick alone, the apprehension felt being that the walls of the brick would collapse and that the fire might then spread to adjoining buildings. However, the walls stood and seemed to be little, if at all, damaged.

The Bartels millinery store in the old wooden building adjoining seemed to be in the most danger and it was early vacated by its occupants, hand. The Garman-Hemenway Company were advertising a big closing-out sale, it having been announced by them that they would close out their stock and retire from business in this city by January 1st. The sale was announced on great signs that were spread over the front of the building, and it was probable due to this fact that the fire was not observed earlier by those passing by. The company occupied both the first and second floors of the building and

The building was the property of O. O. Veatch, on which he carried \$2000 insurance. Mr. Veatch will at once replace the wood and sheet iron front with a modern brick front and replace all the interior wood work and modernize the building in every particular, as it occupies a prominent and valuable corner lot on Main street.

It has again been demonstrated that the city may well congratulate itself upon its efficient volunteer fire department and excellent water system, which has many times proved effective protection against fire.

IN MEMORY OF PRESIDENT BENJ. HARRISON

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 27.—Amid the enthusiastic demonstrations of a great concourse of people, the handsome statue of Gen. Benjamin Harrison, twenty-third president of the United States, was unveiled today. The ceremony of unveiling took place in University Park, opposite the Federal building and in the heart of the downtown section of the city. Surrounding the statue were great stands to accommodate the many distinguished officials and guests invited to take part in the exercises.

From a military standpoint the occasion surpassed any similar event ever held in Indianapolis. The big parade which preceded the unveiling exercises embraced the Tenth Regiment of the regular army, stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison, the notable Black Horse Troop of the Culver Military Academy, a large contingent of the Indiana National Guard, the Spanish-American War Veterans and many semi-military organizations.

Half-way surrounding the monument is a magnificent stone exedra, upon which are carved three short inscriptions. They are: The Union of the States. The Supremacy of Law. Unselfish Public Service. Nowhere on the monument is any reference made to General Harrison's public career, even mention of the fact that he had been president of the United States being eliminated.
