Charles A. Bentel Seriously Burned in His Bakery

San Francisco, Oct. 28.—Charles A. Bentel, of this city, and county treasurer during the administration of former Mayor Schmitz, was seriously burned today by a "flare back" from the oil burning ovens in his bakery on Turk street. Bentel was just starting his fires when the accident happened. He was removed to the hospital, where it is said his case is not necessarily fatal.
