PRESENCE OF SURVEYORS IN COOS CAUSES SPECULATION

The presence of a surveying party which came down from the Umpqua today, in Marshfield this afternoon, gave rise to all sorts of railroad rumors, some declaring that they were selecting a route for the Hill road to Coos Bay, others that it is a Harriman party, and others declaring it was for some other railroad system. The party wasn't talking and just who they are and what their object is had not been ascertained late this afternoon.

The surveyors have seven pack horses and were brought across the bay on a scow. They did not stop long after landing and not one of the small party who saw them land ascertained any definite information.

A. H. Powers, who came overland with his wife, said that he understood that the party was sent out by the United States geological survey. But the number of men and the equipment caused some doubt to this report.

C. J. Mills said that the surveying party did not belong to the Southern Pacific.—Marshfield Times.

WARM CAMPAIGN NEARING CLOSE IN INDIANA

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 30.—The warmest political battle Indiana has seen in recent years will wind up tomorrow night with parades and rallies in every city and town throughout the length and breadth of the state. The great battle in Indiana this year is the election of the state ticket. The presidential contest, of course, has not been neglected, but the leaders here feel that the national ticket will take care of itself. The main fight is for control of the legislature. If the Republicans win, 80 of the 90 counties of the state may exercise local option and James A. Hemenway will be returned to the United States senate. If the Democrats win, there will be no appreciable change in the liquor situation. The law enacted by the Republican legislature provides for local option by counties, while the Democrats advocate local option by townships. Between the two there is a great difference in the practical results, as it is generally admitted that the township plan would not bring about prohibition in any of the larger cities and towns.

The Republicans have made the liquor question the great issue of their campaign. The Democrats, on the other hand, have paid little attention to the liquor issue, but have made much of the alleged extravagance in the Republican administration of the state's business. Both parties have made a thorough canvass of the situation during the present week, and according to the leaders, both are pleased with the result. The officials at the Republican state headquarters say that the returns make the prospects look brighter than four years ago, when Indiana went Republican by a large majority. The Democrats, on the other hand, appear well satisfied with the outlook and insist that a better showing for their ticket could not be desired.
