INCREASE IN GOLD PRODUCTION

The United States will produce more than \$100,000,000 from its gold mines within the current year, according to conservative estimates. The other leading gold-producing countries of the world are Australia, with an output of \$87,000,000 annually from its gold mines; South Africa, whose mines yield \$85,000,000 yearly, and Russia, with \$25,000,000 annually.

The production of gold in the United States has trebled since 1880, and is increasing rapidly as new fields are opened up and better processes of working refractory ores are utilized. The enormous increase in gold supply since the rich mines of Australia, South Africa and Alaska were opened has given rise to speculation as to whether or not gold will not at some time become so plentiful as to be dethroned from the kingdom of precious metals, which position it has held since the earliest known times. It may be that, in a few generations, some rarer and equally durable and attractive, and therefore more precious metal, will supplant gold as the universal standard of material values. In the meantime, however, have faith in your gold.

J. Bourne Jr. is becoming quite an author. Yesterday we received a pamphlet entitled "Reasons Why Taft Should Be Elected President, by Jonathan Bourne Jr." The other day the senator had an article in Collier's explaining "Why a Republican Legislature Must Elect a Democrat to the United States Senate." These subjects are handled quite ably, but we have an idea that Jonathan is better qualified to discuss those more weighty subjects of "Golf as a Statesman's Recreation" and "The American Gentleman's Game of Poker" than he is to wade into the more prosaic subjects that pertain to matters of government.

FRUIT CROP WORTH OVER \$1,000,000

The value of the fruit crop in the counties of Wasco, Hood river, Sherman, Morrow, Gilliam, Wheeler and Crook for 1908 is \$1,136,500, according to a report just filed with W. H. Newell, president of the state board of horticulture, by R. H. Weber, of Portland, commissioner of the Fourth Oregon district. For apples Hood River county leads with 300,000 boxes. The fruit crop shipped from this city during the season amounted to \$225,000. The following is Commissioner Weber's report regarding the value of the fruit crop in the Fourth Oregon district during the last year: Hood River \$800,000 The Dalles 225,000 Mosier 65,000 Gilliam County 16,500 Sherman County 10,000 Morrow County 8,000 Wheeler County 6,000 Crook county 6,000 Total \$1,136,500

"THIS IS MY 53RD BIRTHDAY."

Lord Desborough, known as one of the most versatile men in English public life, was born October 30, 1855. He is pronounced bimetalist and a tariff reformer, a writer and a patron of all sorts of athletics. Several years ago he was regarded as the probable successor of Sir Mortimer Durand in the British Embassy at Washington. In his college days Lord Desborough was a member of the Cambridge crew and for several years he was the amateur punting champion of the Thames. He was also chairman of the committee in charge of the arrangement for the Olympic games held in London the past summer. His versatility may be judged by the wide range of his writings, which include articles on the Rocky Mountains, rowing, the House of Lords and bimetalism. He is a man of great wealth and his place, Tapley Court, is near Windsor castle and adjoins the magnificent estate of William Waldorf Astor.

REPUBLICAN ESTIMATE OF LOWER HOUSE

New York, Oct. 29.—Representative Loudenslager, secretary of the Republican congressional committee, who has been in charge of the headquarters at New York, today gave out his estimate of the complexion of the house of representatives in the 61st congress. He says from several thousand letters received and from personal interviews with observers of all sections of the country, he believes it will be 227 Republicans and 164 Democrats.

He is confident there will be an increase rather than a decrease of Republicans.
