## SCHOOL OFFICIALS TO PUT BAN ON CIGARETTES

Announced at Assembly This Morning That Smoking Must Be Cut Out

It was announced this morning at the high school assembly that smoking among the students must be cut out. This is an action that the board has taken up with the city authorities and are now determined to see that this form of dissipation among the high school boys must cease. It seems that cigarette smoking is indulged in by the younger students to an alarming degree, the school authorities only recently becoming cognizant of the great extent of the practice.

Steps will probably soon be taken to induce the city council to pass some kind of prohibitive measures and strong efforts will be made between now and the time of the meeting of the next legislature to have a bill framed and passed prohibiting the sale of the "coffin mate" in this state. Such a law is now in force in Washington state.

Reports have also reached the school authorities that a certain few of the high school boys are in the habit of becoming intoxicated almost every Saturday night. This practice will be stopped, it is declared, or the offending students may be expelled.
