RETURNS BEHIND IN MASSACHUSETTS

Mass., Nov. 3.—Returns from towns, comprising the first precincts in Massachusetts, heard from: Bryan, 221; Hisgen, 50; Draper, Draper (rep.), 671; Roosevelt, 258. The same precincts gave: Roosevelt, 773.

BRYAN LEADS TAFT IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Nov. 3.—The 32nd precinct gives Taft, 57; Bryan, 92; Chaffin, 4; Debs, 19; Hisgen, 1.

OFFICE HOLDERS FOR TAFT

Montpelier, Nov. 3.—A plurality of 161 for Taft was given today on

the ballot of Vermont legislature. By special enactment a majority of the members of the state legislature cast their ballots at the state house, with the following result: Taft, 192; Bryan, 32; Chaffin, 1. Those participating in the ballot consisted of 198 representatives, four senators, 24 state officials and the state house officers.

First Complete Town.
Boston, Nov. 3.—First complete precinct in Massachusetts to report was the town of Norwell, which gave Bryan, 40; Taft, 164. For governor, Draper (Rep.), 141; Vahey, (Dem.), 57.

California Precincts.
San Diego, Cal., Nov. 3.—Complete returns from Coronado, North Island precinct—Taft, 2. The same precinct in 1904 gave Roosevelt 2.

Los Angeles, Nov. 3.—The first precinct in Los Angeles county to report is located in Santa Monica, where one vote was registered. It was cast for Taft.

HUGHES AND CHANLER

New York, Nov. 3.—Seventeen districts out of 2036 in New York state, outside of Greater New York, give Hughes, 4612; Chanler, 3202. The same districts in 1906 gave Hughes, 4039; Hearst, 2839.

BRYAN RUNNING BEHIND TAFT IN OLD BAY STATE

Cincinnati, Nov. 3.—"I am very much gratified with the report and thank you heartily for letting me know it," was Taft's remark on hearing returns from the first precincts to report in Massachusetts, when reported to him by the Associated Press.

Boston, Nov. 3.—The town of Avon complete. Bryan, 116; Taft, 171; Hisgen, 31; For governor, 154; Vahey, democrat, 139.

TEN TOWNS REPORT.
Boston, Nov. 3.—Returns from 10 towns out of 33 cities and 321 towns comprising ten election districts out of 1030 in the state: Bryan, 470; Taft, 1571; Hisgen, 90. Same cities and towns in 1904 gave Parker 598; Roosevelt, 1577. Returns for president of six out of 205 precincts in Boston, Bryan, 783; Taft, 1494.

BALMY WEATHER AND CLEAR SKIES CAUSE HEAVY EARLY VOTING

New York, Nov. 3.—From throughout practically the entire country reports of the progress of the election, with few exceptions, is the same story of ideal weather conditions and heavy early voting.

The National political headquarters in this city are practically deserted today, both Hitchcock and Mack having gone home to vote. They will return this afternoon, however, and as the returns will be received at both Democratic and Republican headquarters, the quiet of the day will be replaced by a flood of activity as soon as the polls close.

EARLY VOTING IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 3.—Favorable weather and a heavy early vote marked the election in this city today. Shop keepers on Broadway are barricading themselves today against the election night throngs which in New York are usually boisterous with a "rough house" accompaniment. Tammany was out early.

The new registration law will undoubtedly delay voting in many districts, and it is likely that many up-state returns will be in long before the count in many local precincts is well under way.

Returns from Buffalo are generally looked upon as an index of the result in a National election, and they are expected early. The polls close at 5 o'clock up state.

BRYAN CASTS HIS BALLOT

Fairview, Nov. 3.—Election day is marked by clear skies and balmy weather. Bryan was astir early today looking over a mass of telegrams from all parts of the country giving assurances of a Democratic victory. He drove to the grocery store and at 9:15 cast his ballot, No. 43, and as he did so a score of voters removed their hats and offered their best wishes. He then returned to his home to work in his library.

PRESIDENT AND SON VOTE

Oyster Bay, Nov. 3.—On what in all probability his last trip to his home town while he holds the office of president of the United States, Roosevelt returned to this village today to cast his vote for Taft—his final act in support of his warm personal friend. Mrs. Roosevelt and Theodore, Jr., accompanied him. Theodore, Jr., cast his first ballot. A large crowd was at the station to welcome the party, and according to the custom formed a line and passed before the president, who shook hands with many, some of whom presented bouquets of flowers. Later in the morning the president cast his ballot, No. 141, and his son No. 142. The president patted his son on the shoulder after he had voted.

The president's party returned to Washington on a special train this afternoon.

TAFT WILL VOTE LATE

Cincinnati, Nov. 2.—Judge Taft arrived at his home at 8 o'clock this morning, but important business prevented his voting at noon, as expected. He said he would go late this afternoon.

ROCKEFELLER AND PARKER

New York, Nov. 3.—John D. Rockefeller had to stand in line at a Sixth street tailor shop for forty minutes. Judge Alton Parker was almost directly behind. Rockefeller cast ballot No. 198, Parker No. 202.

Indianapolis, November 3.—John W. Kern deposited ballot No. 497.
Utica, Nov. 3.—James S. Sherman voted at 10:30 this morning. He is confident his party will win.

NEW YORK UP-STATE GOES STRONG FOR TAFT

Hughes Ran Ahead of Chanler Also

New York, Nov. 3.—7 p. m.—Based on incomplete returns from many up-state counties, Taft's plurality in New York state, outside of the greater city, is now estimated at 150,000. Later returns, however, may reduce these figures.

Hughes is running strong up state, and there is a belief that he will carry the state by 20,000, based on early returns.

New York, 7:50 p. m., Nov. 3.—Indications are that Taft will carry New York state by over 100,000, and that Hughes will win by 40,000.

St. Louis, Nov. 3.—Because of the confusing ballot the voting progresses slowly. There have been a score of arrests, including Felix Adams, Democratic candidate for the legislature. Several disorders are reported.

Lincoln, Nov. 3.—Both parties claim the state. Clear moderate weather is bringing out a large vote.

Sioux Falls, Nov. 3.—Weather is bright and clear, with early voting, but the tickets are badly split.

Louisville, Nov. 3.—Dense fog early in the morning. Much interest and a heavy vote.

Detroit, Nov. 3.—Heavy early vote, weather perfect.

Millwaukee, Nov. 3.—Clear weather brought out good early vote.

Philadelphia, Nov. 3.—Weather clear; exceedingly heavy vote. Local option great issue.

Trenton, Nov. 3.—Weather fine. Reports from city and country indicate heavy vote.

Indianapolis, Nov. 3.—Pleasant weather brought out a large vote in Indiana today.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 3.—Heavy vote. State Democratic by 45,000.

Helena, Nov. 3.—Ideal weather brought out a heavy early vote throughout Montana today.

Denver, Nov. 3.—Fine weather in Colorado. Heavy vote, more women voting than ever before.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 3.—Good weather favors early voting. Roads in good condition.

Omaha, Nov. 3.—Heavy vote being polled in Nebraska. Beautiful weather.

Toledo, Nov. 3.—Clear and cool. Early vote heaviest in the city's history.

Cleveland, Nov. 3.—Weather clear and cold. Immense size of ballots make voting slow and the count tonight will proceed laboriously.

Cincinnati, Nov. 3.—Early voting light. Foggy and cool.
