Seattle, Nov. 3.—W. W. King, a laborer, forty years of age, was struck on the point of the chin in a fight with Frank Paquette, a barber, in a saloon in South Seattle last night, and instantly killed. Paquette was arrested today. His victim's neck was broken.

### LOST HIS HEAD BY FLYWHEEL

Seattle, Nov. 3.—Joseph Charran, aged 52 years, was caught in the flywheel in the Montana Lumber Company's mill today and his head twisted from his body.

Based on data covering a period of 37 years, District Forecaster Beals of the Portland Weather Bureau, has issued a summary of weather conditions, from which may be judged something of the weather that is to be expected this month. For the 37 years, the normal temperature has been 45.9 degrees. The warmest month was that in 1889, with an average of 52.5 degrees, the coldest month being in 1896, with an average of 38.6 degrees. The average rainfall for the month has been 6.29 inches, the greatest monthly precipitation being 15.77 inches in 1876. The least monthly precipitation was .59 inches in 1890. The average number of clear days has been 5, partly cloudy 9, and cloudy 16.

The motion to arrest judgment was not disposed of, pending which sentences will probably be deferred.

### VERY HEAVY VOTE BEING CAST IN EUNENE TODAY

Weather Was Warm, Bringing Out Large Numbers of Voters to Polls

The weather clerk failed to call the turn on today's weather. Yesterday he predicted rain, but the day has been all sunshine and as warm as many summer days. As a consequence a very heavy vote is being polled in the state of Oregon. The indications are that the vote polled in Eugene by seven o'clock tonight, the time at which the polls close, will be the heaviest in the history of the city. The election boards were kept busy all day long and there was not an idle moment at any of the polling places. From the start it was plainly evident that the vote would be heavy, in one or two precincts a hundred or more voting before nine o'clock in the morning, which is unprecedented.

Several hundred voters were sworn in, they having failed to register, although the registration was larger than at any previous election held in the county. The vote in the several Eugene precincts up to four o'clock this afternoon was as follows:
