TWO STATES STILL IN DOUBT MAY VERIFY CLAIM OF HITCHCOCK

New York, Nov. 5.—Maryland and Missouri continue to hold the stage in the final estimate of votes at Tuesday's election and upon them largely will depend the vindication of Chairman Hitchcock's pre-election prediction that Taft would have 325 electoral votes.

In Missouri Hadley, Republican, for governor has a plurality in excess of 15,000.

Colorado seems to have settled into the Bryan column, while Indiana has gone for Taft.

The Republican majority in the national house of representatives has been cut down, but that party will still have substantial control.

The results so far as other parties are concerned is a disappointment to their managers.

The Socialists expected a "million for Debs," but will fall far short of that, perhaps not half.

The Prohibitionists did not carry the vote with them that they had hoped for, and the Independence party's vote was small in comparison with the expectations of its managers.

BRYAN WIRES BEST WISHES TO WILLIAM H. TAFT

Lincoln, Nov. 5.—Bryan has sent the following telegram to Taft: "Hon. W. H. Taft, Cincinnati, O.—Please accept my congratulations and best wishes for the success of your administration."

Yesterday to a delegation of nearly one hundred personal friends from the city of Lincoln, Mr. Bryan said: "I am highly satisfied over the results in this state. National defeat is not such a disappointment when we have so many things to console us."

Bryan's Statement
Lincoln, Nov. 5.—Mr. Bryan issued a statement today in which he said he felt "that the publicity which we asked for will yet commend itself to the American people."

CALIFORNIA VOTERS ENDORSE JUDGE DUNNE

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—California not only gives a plurality for Taft that will reach 75,000 but sends a solid Republican delegation to Congress and elects a Republican State Legislature that will probably return Perkins to the United States Senate.

Judge Dunne Re-elected.
In the State Legislature the Republicans will have a majority of 46 on a joint ballot and will elect a United States Senator this Winter to succeed Perkins, who, on account of his seniority, is considered to be a valuable man for California to have on Senate committees.

The feature of the San Francisco election was the re-election of Judge Frank H. Dunne, who has presided over the trials of the big grafters, and who sentenced Schmitz to the state prison. A very bitter fight was made against Dunne by the old political machine, which is still directed by the indicted boss, Quett, but the decent element in the city rallied to his support.

MARYLAND GOES FOR BRYAN BY SMALL MARGIN

Baltimore, Nov. 5.—According to unofficial returns received by the Baltimore News from every county in the state and Baltimore city up to 1 p. m., today, Maryland is again with Bryan column by 210 plurality.

St. Louis, Nov. 5.—Returns at hand and one missing county, known to be for Taft, indicate a plurality for him of 839. This may be changed when the complete vote is in, but it looks good for Taft to carry the state.

The legislature is democratic, insuring Senator Stone's re-election.
