## THIRTY-TWO BIRTHS AND TWENTY-SEVEN DEATHS IN OCTOBER

Dr. J. W. Harris, county health officer, has made out his report for October. He reports 32 births, 27 males and ten females, and 27 deaths, the cause of each being as follows:

Apoplexy, 3; senility, 1; tuberculosis, 1; convulsions, 1; gastritis, 1; heart disease, 3; paralysis, 1; Bright's disease, 1; malignant liver, 1; typhoid fever, 1; accidental, 1; premature birth, 1; sore mouth, 1; dysentery, 1; puerperal septicemia, 1; angina pectoris, 1; tumor of brain, 1; lagrippe, 1; exposure and exhaustion, 1.

There were two cases of contagious diseases reported during the month, one of typhoid fever and one of measles.
