COUGARS GET OVER 100 GOATS OUT OF 150 ON CEDAR CREEK

Word reaches us this week that the cougars are more numerous in settled districts than they ever have been heretofore. A considerable loss is reported by the various farmers, and certainly something will have to be done. Between wolves and varmints, sheep, goats and deer are being slaughtered to a prodigious extent.

H. S. Webber, who has a place on Cedar Creek, tells us that last week a big cougar killed a large wether, which was too large for it to carry away, so leaving its victim, the cougar killed another and bore it away. This was within thirty yards of his barn, and they are becoming more and more audacious. Something of an idea of their danger can be obtained when the cougar which killed the wether, smashed its shoulder and broke its neck. They are liable to attack a child at any time, and the bounty for them should be made high enough to make it an object to exterminate them.

Jack Powell has six varmint dogs with which he has killed five cougars since last March. The animals seem to be coming closer to civilization down from the mountains. Out of a bunch of 150 goats, Mr. Webber tells us he has less than fifty left. Raising goats for the varmints is poor business, and he is going to quit trying to raise them.
