

EX-SENATOR CARMACK VICTIM OF POLITICAL FUED IN TENNESSEE

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 9.—Ex-Senator Edward Carmack, editor of the Tennessean, was shot and killed at 4 o'clock this afternoon on Seventh avenue north in front of the Polk Flats, by Robin Cooper, son of Colonel Duncan B. Cooper. Mr. Carmack was going north on Seventh street in front of the flats and Colonel Cooper and his son Robin were approaching Seventh avenue on Union street. Soon after they came into sight of one another the shooting was begun. Robin Cooper, it is said, fired two shots and Senator Carmack one.

Colonel Cooper, it is said, drew his pistol, but did not fire. Due to Editorial Attacks Senator Carmack fell to the ground, dying instantly. Robin Cooper was shot in the right shoulder, but not badly wounded.

It is understood that the trouble was one of the results of a recent Democratic gubernatorial primary, in which Carmack was defeated. Carmack, since he became editor of the Tennessean, has been caustic in criticizing what he called the Democratic machine, and had printed several editorials about Colonel Cooper.

Within the last few days, it is asserted, Colonel Cooper notified Carmack that these editorial criticisms must cease. Another editorial referring to the colonel appeared in the paper this morning and it is supposed to have been the immediate cause of the trouble.

Assassin 27 Years Old As Senator Carmack fell at the edge of the street Colonel Duncan B. Cooper put his arm around Robin Cooper and both walked a few feet down Seventh avenue to Dr. R. G. Ford's, where the slight wound in Robin's shoulder was examined and treated. An ambulance carried the body of Mr. Carmack to an undertaking establishment.

Carmack's pistol, a 32-caliber, was found lying at his side with two chambers empty when the body was picked up and turned over to an officer.

Woman Eye-Witness A Mrs. Eastman, who was near Senator Carmack when the shooting occurred, makes the following statement: "We were walking down Seventh avenue, in the direction of Church street, and had just passed the entrance to the Polk Flats. Mr. Carmack came up the street toward us, smiling as he recognized me. He was some steps away and there were few people on the street. Mr. Eastman and I were near the edge of the sidewalk, and Mr. Carmack passed between us and the entrance. He had raised his right hand up and was about to make a remark when somebody said: 'We've got you all right,' or something to that effect. I can't positively say what the exact words were. It never occurred to me that it was anything more than a friend speaking. Mr. Carmack raised his eyes instantly, put on his hat and ran his hand back, when the same voice said: 'You coward! You are hiding behind a woman, are you?'"

Senator Carmack jumped out so as to get clear of me, and I ran into a gateway. I turned and said: 'For God's sake, don't shoot!' Then I saw Mr. Carmack wheel and fall in a heap in the gutter." Mrs. Eastman said she saw the young man standing over Mr. Carmack, and that he put something in his own pocket.

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A MIGNON FOR VILLARD HALL

The field of musical instrument making, which has shown such an enormous development during the few years, has again been enlivened by a new invention which may be said to mark an epoch in musical history.

The "Mignon", sometimes called the "Wette", is the name given to this new device. Its mission is that of unfolding before the public the art of piano playing, as illustrated by the great masters. It furnishes a direct reproduction of the performances of the virtuosos, not by means of a phonograph, but on the piano itself.

In order to attain this end exceedingly sensitive appliances have been constructed especially for this purpose. During the performance of the pianist these appliances retain his play with all its subtleties and individual characteristics, so as to afterwards re-execute it most accurately by means of the "Mignon", reproducing instrument.

The eminent importance of this invention for the popularization and study of piano music becomes at once evident. It will now be possible for the amateur or artist to delve with real enjoyment into the study of classic compositions and their composers, because the music thus reproduced embodies the conception of the artist who gave it expression, and gives to use the illusion of vividly perceiving with our mental eye his sensitive soul.

The Mignon for Villard Hall arrived in Eugene last Saturday and was taken to the Stevens & Hull Piano House and unboxed. It stands five feet high and five and a half feet long and weighs about 1200 pounds and is an attractive looking instrument. It was moved to the University today and installed in Villard Hall where it will be heard for the first time next Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. Mr. Bruce of Portland will be present and have full charge of the Mignon demonstration.

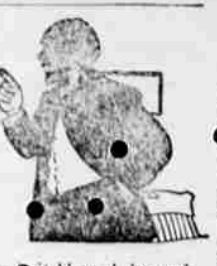
