CALIFORNIA SEES PROBABLE HAY SHORTAGE

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—According to the annual report of the San Francisco Hay Dealers' Association, there is a prospect of a hay shortage in the state this winter, an absolute absence of supply in March next and a raise in price that may this week attain \$26 per ton. The hay crop this year falls short of the 1907 crop by about 100,000 tons, and there is no prospect of relief from Nevada or Utah, as was then afforded. Dealers have ceased to quote prices upon hay, and the prospect of a continued dry spell renders the situation all the more serious.

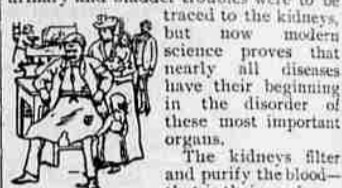
