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WORK TO DEFEAT CHAMBERLAIN FOR SENATOR HAS BEGUN

Anti-statement Republicans feel confident that they will succeed not only in defeating the election of Governor Chamberlain as United States senator, but will elect a Republican instead when the Oregon legislature meets this winter, says the Oregonian. This object will be promoted by the circulation among the voters of the state of petitions addressed to the statement Republican members of both branches of the legislature, relieving them from fulfilling the terms of their pre-election pledges.

The circulation of such petitions will be started in Multnomah county today. It was at first reported that similar petitions would also be circulated in other counties of the state from which statement Republican legislators were elected this year but if that is the intention of those opposing the election of Chamberlain it cannot be learned when the outside counties will be canvassed.

Plan Republican Caucus.

The anti-statement forces also are working to secure the organization of both houses of the legislature. Petitions soon will be circulated among the voters requesting the Republican members of both houses, who took the pledge to enter into a party caucus to insure the organization of the legislature by the Republicans. It is expected that no great resistance will be offered to that plan of action by the statement men, some of whom already have expressed a desire to enter a party caucus and abide by its decision as to the organization of the state's lawmaking body.

The first petitions relieving statement Republicans from living up to their pledge and appealing to them to support only a Republican for Senator will be placed in circulation at a meeting of the Sellwood Republican Club tonight. This was the club that initiated the petition movement which will be taken up during the next few days by the other Republican organizations of this city and county. The form of the petition will not be elaborate. Its declarations will be concise and decidedly to the point.

BASEBALL MAGNATES FACING A SERIOUS BOLT OF LEAGUES

Chicago, Nov. 11.—Eastern League and American Association representatives caused a sensation at the annual meeting of the National association of professional baseball clubs in this city today by withdrawing from the session. The two bolting factions had presented a resolution asking that they be given control of the National Board of Arbitration and that the Western and Southern leagues be reduced from Class A to B. This resolution was voted down by the meeting.

Demand Immediate Action.

President O'Brien of the American Association, then petitioned that the American Association and Eastern League be allowed to withdraw from the National Association and requested permission to negotiate with the American League and National League for a special work agreement.

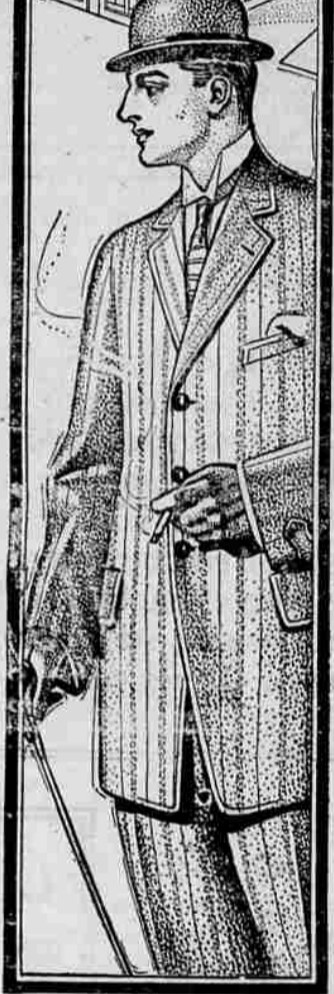
The petitioners insisted upon immediate action and when their petition was overwhelmingly defeated the two factions withdrew from the meeting. They declined to make any statement other than that they did not propose to be governed by a great number of "bush leagues." Their next move, it is said, will be to confer with the two big leagues—the American and the National—with the hope that they may be given permission to act as a separate organization, really a third league.

Rumors which could not be confirmed, had it that the American Association had not given up all idea of invading major league territory and that designs were held on Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, St. Louis and Chicago. It goes without saying that the American association has nothing to hope for from the National commission.

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YOUNGEST SON OF HENRY WATTERSON MEETS TRAGIC DEATH

New York, Nov. 11.—Harvey W. Watterson, a lawyer and younger son of Henry Watterson, editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, plunged to his death from the 19th floor of his office buildings at 37 Wall street late this afternoon. His body shot downward from a height of 110 feet and landed on the roof of a 10-story building adjoining. Almost every bone was broken and the head was crushed.

While there were no witnesses to the tragedy, evidently it was entirely accidental. Mr. Watterson's hat and coat were on his closed desk. Presumably he had attempted to lower the window, and either stumbling over the radiator, which was in front of the low sill, or losing his footing in some other manner, pitched forward and down to death on the roof of the building below.

Mr. Watterson was 30 years old and married. He was a junior member of the law firm of Wing, Russell & Watterson.

CHARGED WITH COMMISSION OF FIFTY MURDERS

Wallace, Idaho, Nov. 11.—Facing the charge of committing at least 50 murders and innumerable robberies, two men giving the names of A. J. Manning and O. B. Bliss, said to be members of a gang of desperadoes, are under heavy guard today, for it is feared that an attempt will be made by their confederates to liberate them.

The charge that led directly to their arrest is that of passing bogus checks on railroad contractors. After searching the record of the two prisoners, however, the police were convinced that they are members of a gang that operated in construction camps and murdered 50 workmen between Grand Forks, Idaho, and Taft, Montana. In each instance robbery was the motive.

All the dead men were found, sometimes as many as three in a day, with skulls crushed and pockets turned out. The theory advanced by the police is strengthened by the fact that the prisoners own a trunk in which the police found wigs, false mustaches, a complete set of burglar's tools, stolen mining stock and a rubber stamp for forging checks. The police authorities are elated over the capture for they think a great deal of their worry is over now.
