BIG TURKEY FOR PRES. ROOSEVELT'S THANKSGIVING

Providence, R. I., Nov. 12.—On Thanksgiving Day, as usual, a mammoth Rhode Island turkey is to grace the holiday table at the White House. And as usual the turkey in all probability will come from Connecticut. Most of the Rhode Island turkeys now come from the Vermont State, just as most of the Vermont birds, formerly the best accepted substitutes for the Rhode Island bird, now come from Kentucky.

Horace Vose of Westerly, this state, known all over the country as the Thanksgiving provider for the President—who has furnished the turkeys to every president from Grant to Roosevelt—is on the alert for the best bird reared in this section of New England for the Thanksgiving dinner of the Roosevelt family. As this is to be Mr. Roosevelt's last Thanksgiving in the White House, Mr. Vose says he hopes to be able to send him a bird that will be a record-breaker both as regards size and fine flavor. Mr. Vose has been looking over the flocks, but as yet is undecided as to what particular turkey will be sent to the President.

WILLIAMS TO HANG AT SAN QUENTIN

San Quentin, Cal., Nov. 12.—Tomorrow is the date fixed for the execution of Mark A. Williams, the Oakland murderer, who recently sought to cheat the gallows by attempting suicide. The crime for which Williams is to pay the death penalty was one of the most brutal in the criminal annals of Alameda county. His victim was Mrs. Vernie Carnia, a woman with whom he lived in Elmhurst, a suburb of Oakland. Williams murdered the woman in a fit of jealous rage and then endeavored to hide his crime by burying her body beneath a shed in the rear of his home.

Politics and Politicians

The next Pennsylvania delegation in congress will consist of 27 Republicans and 5 Democrats.

One of the surprises of the recent election in New York city was the poor showing made by the Socialist candidates.

Jonah Kalamiananolo, Republican territorial delegate to congress from Hawaii, was re-elected, but his plurality was considerably less than he received two years ago.

One of the surprising features of the recent election in Utah was the overwhelming defeat of the American (anti-church) ticket in Salt Lake county.

Congressman William P. Hepburn, who was among the Republican members to go down to defeat, has represented the Eighth district of Iowa for twenty years.

Carroll S. Page, the new United States senator from Vermont, is a former governor of that state. He is a man of much wealth and is said to be the largest dealer in green cash in the world.

Representative Charles N. Fowler of New Jersey, who has announced himself as a candidate for the speakership, is the recognized authority of the house on the subject of finance. For some years he has been chairman of the committee on banking and currency.

Conflicting reports are in circulation as to whether General E. Wright will be asked to continue as secretary of war after the inauguration of President Taft. It is known that the President-elect entertains high regard for General Wright, but the latter is said to have a strong desire to return to the practice of law.

One of the thirty-one senators to take seats March 4 next have been elected already. They are Johnston of Alabama, McEnery of Louisiana.

ana, Dillingham of Vermont and John Walter Smith of Maryland, succeeding themselves, and former Governor W. O. Bradley of Kentucky, succeeding Senator James B. McCreary.
