## WILL PROCEED WITH CITY'S ELECTRICAL POWER PLANT

At an informal meeting of the city council this morning it was decided to go ahead immediately with the city's power plant with which to furnish electricity for the operation of the water plant. Engineer F. C. Kelsey, who furnished the plans for the plant, was here this morning and met with the mayor and councilmen. He will have charge of the construction work. To a reporter he stated that he would commence work on the plant in a very short time. It will be located just below the new Hendricks bridge across the McKenzie where there is ample water power to drive the wheels of a very large plant.

## PACKING PRUNES FOR THE FANCY TRADE

Allen Fruit Company Putting Up This Year's Dried Crop for Shipment to Eastern Cities

The Allen Fruit Co's cannery is again a busy scene, a good-sized force of women and girls being employed therein packing dried prunes for shipment to the East. The prunes are packed very carefully in layers and each box is lined with paper. These go to the best trade in the Eastern cities and bring fancy prices. Stewed prunes, which are among the commonest articles of food on this coast are considered a luxury in most Eastern cities.

The work of packing apples will begin at the cannery tomorrow by the Lane County Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association. Two car loads will be packed for shipment at first and several more car loads will follow later on.

The work of canning apples will begin early next week and this will continue two weeks or more.

## OREGON 'VARSITY HOPES TO DEFEAT WASHINGTON

Washington Arrived This Afternoon—Expects to Win From 'Varsity

The University of Oregon can win tomorrow from the Washington eleven, if the team has the ability to execute the plays they have been taught this season. They will win if they are individually and collectively competent to execute the plans that Coach Forbes has drilled into them against a strong team. The game with Washington appears to be the hardest the team will have. While the O. A. C. game may hold the greatest interest, it will be no harder.

The game will probably simmer down to whether or not the Oregon men are equal to the Washington in strength or in shiftness. The Seattle teams is 47 pounds heavier in the aggregate, the Oregon team averaging 174, while the Washington team averages about 190 pounds. If Oregon has speed enough to overcome the handicap in weight for either a touchdowns or for place kicks, the local university will have a good chance of winning the game. Coach Forbes has taught enough in variety of attack and versatility of playing to deceive any team, and the only question that remains is the material of the squad capable of executing the shifty plans used.

That Washington is not overconfident is plain from the statements made in their college papers. They say they have a hard fight. At the same time they have expressed themselves as afraid of Moulton's foot, and calculate to make as many touchdowns as Moulton does place kicks.

There is a slight change in the opening lineup of the Oregon team. Main has been drawn to half, and Sullivan will take the other back position with Fullback Clarke. Newton, who tips the beam at 200, will go in at right guard, for the first time.

The Washington team came in this afternoon accompanied by about twenty enthusiasts. They appear to be a husky lot of fellows and in fairly good shape.

## Washington Ringers.

Much has been said lately of Muckleston and Eakin, the first a right half, the other, left tackle. It is claimed that the men are ineligible under the conference rules.

The University feels that the Oregon team is imposed upon by the presence of the two men in the lineup, but as each faculty is its own judge, they can do nothing but play the aggregation, whether the two men are ringers or not.

It is known that the two men played last year at the North Dakota Agricultural College, and had the standing of freshmen there. University students from the same college and class knew them both. Coach Forbes stated today, that his team would be sportsmanlike, and play with the men in the lineup, even though they felt that Washington was not living up to the rules.

The luxury of the Washington faculty, even in not making a statement, appears to be very great, when it is remembered that Oregon kept out Russ Coleman on the least taint of suspicion, Coleman, however, has been reinstated by the A. A. C. and could play tomorrow if the faculty would let him.

## REPUBLICAN LEADERS CONFER AT HOT SPRINGS

Hot Springs, Va., Nov. 12.—What must be designated as the "near-captain" seems to have been established here in the Virginia mountains. President-elect Taft has surrounded him today the largest coterie of statesmen and politicians that have been with him since the election. Vice-President-elect Sherman arrived today with William L. Ward, of New York, national committee-man from that state, and Representative Theodore A. Burton, of Cleveland, came on the midnight train for a visit of at least 10 days.

Senator Bourne, of Oregon, arrived yesterday, and Senators Burkett, of Nebraska, and Scott, of West Virginia, came in today.

"I am here just for fun," said Mr. Sherman. "Yes, you may call me Mr. Vice President. I like it. I play golf and I have my stinks with me. I shall stay a week at least. My long suit is talking as I play and if I can get up a game with Judge Taft I shall do my best to talk him out of his good playing."

"Seriously," Mr. Sherman added. "If Mr. Taft wants to talk over the problems ahead, I shall be very glad to do so, but as for having any specific object in view for my visit, there is none."

While the candidacy of Representative Burton for the senatorship to succeed Mr. Forbes has been mooted for some time, the matter will doubtless be fully discussed with Mr. Taft.
