HARVEY JONES IS ON TRIAL IN CIRCUIT COURT

Charged with contributing to Delinquency of Minor Girl. Several Liquor Indictments

The principal case of interest in the circuit court today is the trial of Harvey Jones, charged with contributing to the delinquency of Addie Watts, a minor girl. The work of securing the jury was commenced early in the forenoon and was not completed until this afternoon. The jury consists of the following: E. E. Aubrey, G. A. Dyson, F. L. Gum, Frank Goodpasture, J. S. Ham, L. M. Toller, James Humphrey, W. E. Flak, A. A. Gibson, A. N. Striker, John Hammitt.

L. M. Travis, J. S. Medley and W. G. Martin are Jones' attorneys while the estate is represented by District Attorney E. R. Bryson and his deputy, G. F. Skipworth.

The courtroom has been crowded all afternoon with curious spectators to hear the testimony. The Watts girl is the principal witness.

More Indictments. The grand jury last evening brought in the following indictments: Hynson Smyth, Jr., John Williams and Joseph Jacobs, all charged with violating the local option law. They were arraigned at the night session of the court and time for pleading was set for one o'clock this afternoon. Each furnished bail.

A demurrer to Williams and Smyth was filed and has been taken under advisement. Jacobs entered a plea of not guilty.

Harry Tabor, who was indicted yesterday for manslaughter, entered a plea of not guilty this morning.

Verdict for Chezem. The jury in the case of J. R. Chezem vs. Mt. Pisgah Lodge, No. 139, I. O. O. F., at 4 o'clock this afternoon returned a verdict in favor of Chezem for \$1326.

the table with the blood streaming from his wound.

Haas was immediately overpowered by spectators and thrown into the empty jury box, where he is now lying pinioned on his back. Heney is conscious and medical aid has not yet arrived, but he is supposed to be mortally wounded. Haas, who did the shooting, is a saloonkeeper, who was summoned as a special venireman on a former bribery case. At that time he was severely cross-examined by Heney and the information concerning his life brought out at that time he claimed has practically ruined his business. It was shown by Heney that Haas was an ex-convict.

LATER—Heney has been removed to the emergency hospital and is still conscious. It is not believed that he can live.

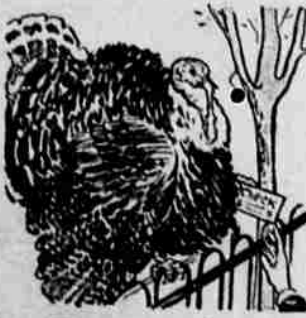
