GIRL FOUND DEAD FROM GAS FUMES

Circumstances point to the Commission of Great Crime

Atlantic City, Nev., 14.—With gas pouring from an unlighted gas jet, Ella Clark, the pretty eighteen-year-old daughter of a well-to-do resident, was found dead in a boat house near here, and nearby were the unconscious forms of Arthur Penney, aged 18, Walter Reynolds, aged 18, sons of well-known citizens. Three glasses and a bottle of whiskey were found in the room where the trio were discovered.

Detectives believe the girl was enticed to the boathouse and plied with liquor, and it is believed the gas was accidentally turned on after one of the youths had extinguished the lights.

HARVEY JONES FOUND GUILTY BY JURY

After Deliberating for Several Hours Return Verdict of Conviction

The case of the state vs. Harvey Jones, accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, went to the jury at 11 o'clock this forenoon and at 3 o'clock this afternoon brought in a verdict of guilty. The demurrers in the cases of the State vs. John Williams and Hynson Smith, charged with selling liquor, were overruled this morning and both entered pleas of not guilty.

SAMPSON ARRESTED FOR STEALING A REVOLVER

This afternoon a fellow giving the name of Sampson and claiming to be a waiter by trade and hailing from San Francisco, was arrested by Sheriff Harry Bown for the theft of a revolver. He is in the county jail awaiting an examination. Sampson stayed at the Matlock lodging house last night. The story he tells is that after getting up this morning he met a man on the street who wanted to sell him a revolver. He says he told the man he would take it and sent him to the room in the Matlock house to get the money under the pillow. As the story seemed fishy and as the owner of the revolver was found, Sampson was placed under arrest.
