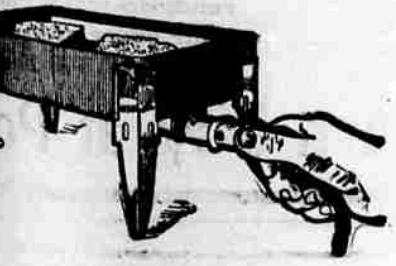

SECRETARY METCALF RESIGNS BECAUSE OF POOR HEALTH

Washington, Nov. 13.—Informed by his physicians that it would be necessary for him to take a complete rest for two months, Secretary Metcalf, of the navy department, handed in his resignation to the president today, and Assistant Secretary Newberry was appointed Secretary. Mr. Metcalf seemed to be enjoying excellent health when he returned from his vacation, but he soon began to fall under the strain of official duty and anxiety over the condition of his son, who is now in a sanitarium at Los Angeles. He was unable to go on the stump during the campaign, owing to an attack of illness, and again yesterday he was confined to his house, but he was able to attend the cabinet meeting this morning. He discussed with the president the surgeon-general's dictum that he must have an absolute rest, and, as he did not wish to absent himself for two months when his term of office was nearly at an end, he tendered his resignation, and after going to his office, made it out in regular form and sent it in.

VEATCH BUILDING BEING TORN DOWN

New Modern Block Will Be Built At An Approximate Cost of \$6000

Cottage Grove enterprise again comes to the front this week. On Tuesday Oliver Veatch let the contract for a fine new building to Geo. Lea, of this city, to occupy the site of the building recently destroyed by fire. Workmen are now at work tearing out the charred insides of the present structure, and as soon as possible will take the walls down. Mr. Veatch tells us his first intention to repair the building has given way to the idea of an entirely new structure more modernly built, and of stronger walls. We are informed that the estimate on the cost runs well into six thousand dollars.

The work will be rushed from start to finish. It is hoped to have the new building up and ready for occupancy by the first of the new year, but progress in building may be hampered by the weather. The new building will be 70 feet deep, and will set back five feet from its present frontage. The front will be entirely modern, with a fine plate glass display window. A side window is contemplated, which will add greatly to its value to its occupant as a means of display. The building will be two stories high, and a warehouse of brick extending 20 feet in the rear is also contemplated. Another slightly building will thus add to the beauty of Main street, and not only be a credit to its owner, but to the town as well.—Western Oregon.
