HOW Y. M. C. A. IS MAINTAINED AND MANAGED

Each Local Organization Is Supreme and Independent of the Others

In view of the present movement in this city, the question has naturally arisen as to the management and maintenance of a Young Men's Christian Association. Each local organization is supreme and independent of other associations, although it affiliates with other associations in the state for certain lines of work. The management of the affairs of the association is in the hands of a board of directors which are elected by the membership. When the movement was first started in Eugene about three years ago, the following board of directors were elected: Samuel Roome, president; E. O. Potter, Secretary; R. A. Booth, P. L. Campbell, F. L. Chambers, C. S. Frank, T. G. Hendricks, F. W. Osburn, P. E. Snodgrass. These men have incorporated and will hold office until the first election after the building is open. A building committee will be appointed by this board to study and select plans for the erection of the building and supervise it until it is completed. The property is held by a board of trustees who are elected by the directors.

Mr. E. U. Lee, the popular county clerk, has been elected treasurer of the building fund. Arrangements will doubtless be made whereby subscribers can pay their subscriptions at the bank where they carry their accounts.

It is probable that the membership fee of the Association will be \$10.00 per year for men and \$5.00 for boys under seventeen. This is uniform with associations in cities of similar size. These memberships are transferable to any other association in the world. In addition to the membership fees, small fees are charged for locker rentals and night classes. The \$10.00 membership fee includes all the privileges of the association such as the gymnasium, swimming pool, baths, use of reading room and library, special rates to lectures and entertainments. It is thought that there will be a membership of not less than two hundred and fifty men and one hundred boys.

The plans for the building include a number of dormitory rooms. After investigating conditions it is believed that from twenty to twenty-five rooms could be rented in Eugene. These rooms will be very desirable,

having steam heat, private shower baths, and all of the other features of the building accessible. They are limited, however, to members of the association and not thrown open to the public. These rooms will doubtless rent from ten to twelve dollars a month. It will be wise to make the building plans so as to allow for twenty or twenty-five of these rooms. This would bring in a net revenue to the association of approximately \$2000 per year. The more money, therefore, invested in this feature of the building will mean greater efficiency in maintaining the financial side of the organization.

The annual expenses of the association approximate \$8000, in cities the size of Eugene. This covers heat, light, water, janitor's salary, salaries of the secretary and physical director, printing and postage and stationery and expense of physical, social, religious, educational and boys' work. The membership fees and income from dormitory rentals should cover over eighty-five or ninety per cent of this expense, leaving the remainder to be secured in subscriptions from older men who may not care to take the advantages of membership, but would be glad to have a share in the work. It would not be wise to charge a large enough membership to make the association entirely self-supporting, as it would prohibit many young men from joining. The thought is to provide all the advantages of a first class club and a Christian home within reach of the poor young man.

The work of the association is largely carried on by committees, the chairman of which are members of the Board of Directors or make reports to the Board. These committees supervise the religious, educational, social, physical and boys' work, with various sub-committees in each department. An association the size of the one contemplated would use not less than one hundred men in committee service. The association is a democratic institution and every member can have the opportunity, not only of enjoying its privileges, but taking active part in carrying on its work.

The General Secretary has supervision of the association work, under the direction of the Board of Directors, and an expertly becomes one man in such a capacity citizens of the community. He is a friend to the boys and young men and has the opportunity for their friendship and acquaintance that few men can enjoy. It is by no means an easy position to fill, and as soon as sufficient funds are subscribed, the board of directors will take steps to secure the right kind of a man for the place. The Physical Director is also an important office, as to him is entrusted the responsibility of the physical life of the boys and young men. He enters into their play life and is not merely a leader of classes but is a promoter of health and clean living.

REV. F. E. DARK AT BAPTIST CHURCH
