JAP EMPEROR REVIEWS ENTIRE FIGHTING FLEET

Kobe, Nov. 18.—The fighting craft of Japan, comprising 110 vessels, exclusive of submarines, passed in review before the emperor today. The weather was perfect and the occasion will long be remembered. Kobe was gorgeously decorated and tonight the fleet will be brilliantly illuminated by electric lights outlining each vessel.

STATE WINS IN THE OREGON CITY LOCKS CASE

The state's interest in the locks at Oregon City to the amount of \$200,000 was confirmed today when the supreme court denied the petition for rehearing the case of the State vs. the Portland General Electric Company. This amount by today's decision is ascertained to be an investment from the common school fund by virtue of an act of the legislature of 1870, which granted a like sum to the original company for the construction of the locks. Furthermore, an accounting is now due from the corporation by which the state will receive ten per cent of the net revenue from the locks since 1897. The sum will revert to the school fund. By the terms of the original grant 10 per cent of the proceeds should have been paid to the state annually, but all that share which should have been paid before 1897 can never be recovered by the state because of the status of limitations. The case was decided in May. The way is now clear for the joint purchase of the locks by the federal government and the state for which purpose the legislature has already appropriated \$200,000. The locks will then be free to navigators.

LABOR LEADERS DINED AT WHITE HOUSE LAST NIGHT

Washington, D. C., Nov. 17.—Sub-ject. His guests, who were representatives of many of the leading labor organizations of this country, to a rapid fire of questions, President Roosevelt at a dinner given by him at the White House tonight endeavored to learn what labor wanted from congress and in what way he could be of assistance to the toilers of the country.

While the President did not commit himself to any of the propositions submitted by the various labor leaders present, it was learned that he sought a full expression of sentiment from all of them.
Justice Moody, Secretary Strauss and Secretary Garfield asked questions of some of the captains of labor.
The general impression prevailed among the labor leaders after the dinner that the President's message to congress would show some of the flavor of the conference.
