DISTRICT FAIR
OPENED AT COTTAGE GROVE TODAY

Three Days' Festival Begins Under Most Favorable Auspices

Guard Special Service. Cottage Grove, Nov. 19.--The first annual harvest fair to be held by the Cottage Grove District Fair Association opened this morning under very favorable auspices. Heavy rains during the past two days have ceased. The program of the day opened at 10 a. m. with music by the band in the bandstand, on the corner of Main and Fourth streets, after which the band formed at the head of a parade and marched to the fair grounds at the end of Fifth street, about a quarter of a mile from the business section of the city.

At the grounds have been erected a pavilion, poultry building and stock sheds. President Thomas Pierce, of the association, opened the exercises at the grounds with an address at 10 a. m. He explained the object of the association and told of the trouble experienced in getting buildings, etc., arranged in time to hold the exhibition at this time.

The program arranged for the fair is very extensive and consists of both daily and evening attractions. Tomorrow is designed to be the big day of the fair. It is designated as W. O. W. day, and then the city will be turned over to the Woodmen of the World of Lane county, and special pains taken to make the day attractive and instructive to the members of the order as well as to all who attend the fair. There will be a big log rolling and drills by different teams in the order. In the evening will be children's night and the pupils of the Cottage Grove schools will take part in exercises to be held in the pavilion at the fair grounds. The display of apples, pears, quinces and other fruits is very creditable. The exhibit of canned fruits shows fine quality and a great variety. The dairy section display is small, but shows excellent quality. The showing of livestock is not as large as was anticipated, but some of the finest stock in this county is on exhibition and includes several breeds of cattle, sheep, goats and swine, and also some horses.

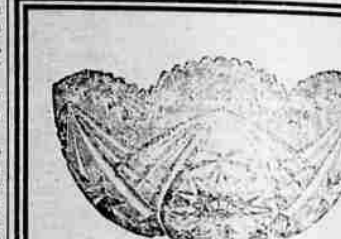
The biggest thing on the grounds is the exhibit of poultry. This section shows fowls of nearly every known variety, and includes chickens, ducks, geese and turkeys, as well as several kinds of pet poultry. The people of Cottage Grove are expecting a large crowd the next two days and those having the affair in charge will do everything possible to fittingly entertain all who come to the fair. The attendance today was not up to expectations, owing to the sloppy condition of the roads. People in Eugene will miss one of the features of the fall if they do not attend the Cottage Grove fair. It is instructive in more ways than one and Eugeneans owe it to their neighboring city to show an appreciation of the efforts put forth to hold an exhibition of the character of the one now being held here. It is the intention of the management of this association to make the fair a permanent institution and hold a fair each year hereafter.
