The football game between the Portland East Side and the Eugene high tomorrow afternoon is creating much more speculation than the average game. Portland high advocates declare that East Side is bound to win. Their argument is based on comparative scores: That Salem beat the local boys and Portland beat Salem. And even before Salem was beaten it was questioned whether it would be possible for any school to defeat their last aggregation. The Eugene boys look at it this way: Before the Salem game they were pretty badly used up as a result of the game with Astoria the week before. Salem's team was at its best. They all feel that they did not do themselves justice then. When Salem was beaten by East Side, she was crippled from the game with Eugene a few days before. In this way the two defeats are accounted for. Now, last week, the local team held down the Albany College, which is considered in the Varsity rank, to a close score. This week every member of the local team is in good condition. They have been going through the hardest kind of practice and feel that it will be a hard fight. The line-up will be the same as in the Salem game, but Coach Hug says that the first man who doesn't fight will be taken out. He will have most of the second team in suits to go in if necessary.

This game is the last game in which five of the star players will participate for the high school. They are: Bailey, Kaykendall, Kreiger, Knox and Preston. All of these men will probably try for the varsity team next year.

This evening a rally or demonstration of some sort will be held on the streets.

The Portland boys arrive this evening on the local. The game will be called tomorrow at 5 o'clock. The admission is 50 cents.

 companies of Marines, 2 companies of blue-jackets, from the President's yacht, Mayflower, and the Dolphin were in line. The United States Marine Band. The second division consisted of the District of Columbia Militia, composed of the 1st and 2nd regiments of Infantry, the 1st separate battalion, the Signal Corps, the 1st Battery Field Artillery, the Naval Battalion, the High School Cadets, headed by the Engineers' band.

The third division of the parade was composed of veteran societies of the Army of the Potomac, of the Cumberland, the Tennessee and the Ohio, whose members served under the famous soldier in whose honor they were assembled.

President Roosevelt addressed the assemblage and pronounced a splendid tribute to the valor and the military genius of Sheridan. Horace Porter, formerly ambassador to France, also spoke in honor of the soldier and patriot and told of his daring deeds on the field of battle.

### CAPTAIN THEORIN ELUSIVE SAILOR

Albany, Or., Nov. 23.—Police of this city have searched in vain all day for Captain P. Theorin, who is wanted in Portland to answer to the charge of killing M. C. Hassmussen, watchman of the steam schooner Washington. They found that a man supposed to be Theorin spent last night at a hotel here, but this man left Albany this forenoon after his alleged recognition by a sailor from Yaquina bay.
