These brothers created a disturbance at a religious meeting at Tiptonville Saturday night and when the officers attempted to arrest them a fight ensued in which the negroes shot the officers and made their escape.

COURT RULES STRONGLY AGAINST DEFENDANT

Roy Lamphere Gets Hard Deal In Jury Instructions

La Porte, Ind., Nov. 25.—The state scored a big victory in the Lamphere trial when Judge Richter, after exhaustive arguments on both sides, announced that he would instruct the jury that if the evidence shows that Lamphere set fire to the Guinness house, even if the fire did not cause the death of any persons therein, the jury must find him guilty of arson. The instructions will also contain a paragraph that if the jury finds that any one of the four persons in the house lost his or her life as a result of the fire, and that Lamphere set that fire, then it must find Lamphere guilty of murder of manslaughter.

LECOMPTE EXECUTED BY REVOLUTIONISTS

Outrages Drove People of Jeremie to Desperation

Port au Prince, Nov. 25.—The report that General Lecompte, Haytien minister of the interior, was killed at Jeremie was confirmed today. Arriving at Jeremie Lecompte found the commander, Captain Ostema, of treason and had him executed. Lecompte later had two prominent citizens of Jeremie executed. These outrages wrought the people up and they armed themselves, took Lecompte prisoner and executed him.

CASTELLANE'S SUIT OPENS IN PARIS

Wants His Children and Forty Thousand Dollars a Year

Paris, Nov. 25.—The suit of Count Boni de Castellane against his former wife, who was Miss Anna Gould, and is now the wife of Prince Helle de Sagan, for custody of his three children, opened here today. The count's counsel presented the general ground for the suit, charging the alleged scandalous conduct of Prince Helle de Sagan; that he has not reformed since marriage; that the conduct of the princess before her marriage to de Sagan had been improper. He asks that the princess be compelled to contribute \$40,000 annually to the support of the children, and that the children be awarded to him because z tehmaor123456 TAON ETAON the moral atmosphere of the de Sagan household is unfit for the children.

STRIKERS WOUNDED BY DEPUTY SHERIFFS

Perth Amboy, Nov. 25.—A crowd of strikers at the works of the National Fireproofing Company at Keasby, who struck for higher wages last week, were fired upon by a squad of fifty deputy sheriffs in that village. Several were wounded, two seriously.

Troops Are Refused

Trenton, Nov. 25.—Governor Fort has been requested by Prosecutor Bernadine of Middlesex county to send troops to Perth Amboy to quell the riot there. The governor refused and said the request must come from the sheriff, but notified Colonel Dugan to hold the Trenton battalion in readiness.

PORT OF PORTLAND LAW IS VALID

Salem, Or., Nov. 24.—In affirming the decree of Judge C. U. Gantenbein, of the Circuit Court for Multnomah County, in the case of Sylvester Farrell vs. the Port of Portland, the Supreme Court this morning validated the adoption of the amendment to the act creating the port, authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 bonds for the purpose of establishing and maintaining an efficient towage and pilotage service between Portland and the sea. The opinion is written by Chief Justice Bean.

This action was brought to enjoin the Board of Commissioners from carrying into effect the provision of the amendment, which was proposed by the initiative and adopted by the voters on the ground that such law is void. In passing upon the salient features of the case the court held that the Port of Portland is a municipal corporation organized in pursuance of an act of the Legislature of 1901, but that it is neither a city or a town in the strict, technical sense.
