COLONIAL JACK

ARRIVES HERE ON UNIQUE TRIP

Man Pushing a Wheelbarrow Around Border of United States Here Today

J. A. Krohn, known as "Colonial Jack," of Portland, Maine, arrived in Eugene this afternoon with his queer wheelbarrow outfit, on his way around the border of the United States afoot. He began his unique journey at Portland, Maine, on June 1, last, and must arrive there by September 1, 1923, to win a wager.

The traveler's equipment consists of a pyramid-shaped box, mounted like a wheelbarrow. It attracted a great deal of attention on Willamette street this afternoon. In this is kept his papers and the few articles he carries. Mrs. Krohn is accompanying her husband by train, meeting him once or twice a week at points where he is scheduled to pass. The expense of the trip is defrayed by the sale of aluminum medals bearing a bas-relief of Krohn and his odd vehicle on one side and a legend explanatory of his trip on the other.

"I am obliged to average 2 1/2 miles a day in order to complete the 9000-mile trip on time," said Mr. Krohn this afternoon, "but I have been making better time than that right along. I am now 500 miles ahead of my schedule. I am writing a book of my experiences and my observations of the country I have through. I have wagered 2000 copies of this book against \$9000 that I reach Portland, Maine, by September, 1923.

"I followed the northern boundary to Seattle and mean to follow the coast to Los Angeles; cross the Southern states to Jacksonville, Florida; then up the coast to Portland. I hope to arrive in San Francisco on Christmas day.

"I am in the best of health. During the first two weeks of my trip I lost 20 pounds, but now my weight is normal. I lost two days last week at Orilla, Wash. I fainted on the road and was obliged to stay at a farmhouse two days to recuperate. This was my first sick spell, although frequently I have been delayed by injuries to my feet. Some days I keep up a pretty good gait; other days I can't make the time. Weather conditions are against me very often. In 19 days of the 25 I was in Montana, I walked in rain and snow."

THEORIEN HAS

DISAPPEARED FROM SIGHT

F. Thorien, wanted in Portland for the murder of M. C. Rasmussen, has apparently made good his escape from his part of the state.

Since Thorien was met and recognized on the streets of Albany Monday morning by two gallers from Yaquna Bay, he has completely disappeared. The Portland officers incline to the belief that he has doubled back toward Portland and is working his way into the metropolis. "Colonial Jack," the man who is touring the country with a wheelbarrow and who is in Eugene today, passed a man believed to be Thorien at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning between Marlon and Turner. The stranger answered the description of the supposed murderer and carried a satchel like that Thorien had with him at Albany.

The officers believe that it was Thorien's plan to go to Yaquna Bay and leave that port by boat and that he stopped in Albany for that purpose. He is known to have made inquiries about the boat service from Yaquna but his meeting with Captain Jacobsen of Newport at Albany stopped that plan and he appears to have returned toward Portland in an effort to get a vessel there. As Thorien has spent his life on the sea the officers believe he will try to reach a seaport as soon as possible.

It has developed that Thorien is out of money. Officer Fox, of the Albany police force discovered that the suspect had sold his overcoat—the same one he wore when seen on the deck of the schooner Washington at the time of the murder—to "Doc" Cooper.

As the officers believe that Thorien is now nearing Portland, efforts to apprehend him in this vicinity have practically ceased.
