ANNIVERSARY OF THE ESCAPE OF GENERAL MORGAN

Columbus, O., Nov. 27—Today was the forty-fifth anniversary of the escape of General John H. Morgan, the famous "raider," and Thomas H. Hines from the penitentiary in this city. The sensation which the escape of the famous prisoners of war created is still fresh in the minds of the older generations of both North and South.

The cell from which General Morgan escaped is still pointed out to visitors to the penitentiary. The round hole which formed the entrance to the tunnel through which the escape was effected is still to be seen. Some years ago a tablet commemorating the event was placed above the cell door. Since the day of Morgan's escape the cell has never been occupied.

Accounts of the escape differ and are told in many and varied forms. The most plausible, however, is that a hole was cut in the stone slab in the floor, through the ground beneath into an air chamber which runs beneath the cell block. Moving along the air chamber, the prisoners wormed their way eight coils east and then started digging out beneath the hall and under the wall until the level of the female department was reached. Here the tunnel was dug upward and opened in the yard. Securing a rope and hook on the night of November 27, 1863, the escape was effected by throwing the hook upon the wall and climbing the rope. After clearing the prison wall General Morgan hailed a passing cab and was driven to the depot. He took a train for Cincinnati, and from there crossed the Ohio river into Kentucky, where he set his fate in trying to avoid recapture.

SOUTH HONORS ITS FAMOUS SCOUT

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 27—Interesting exercises were held today in observance of the forty-fifth anniversary of the execution of Sam Davis, the noted Confederate scout, who was captured in the Federal lines at Pulaski, Tenn., November 22, 1863, with papers giving the field positions of the Federal troops, and hanged as a spy five days later by order of General Dodge.

"Had I a thousand lives I would lose them all before I would betray my friends" were the words spoken by Davis as he sat on the edge of his coffin, conducted to the execution after General Dodge had offered him his "horse, side arms and an escort to the Rebel lines if he would tell who the traitor was from whom he obtained the papers found on him when captured."

The last session of the Tennessee legislature made an appropriation for a statue of Davis to be erected on Capitol Hill in this city. The statue

is of bronze and of heroic proportions, and was modelled by George Julian Zolnay, the well-known sculptor.

SHERIFF SPERLOCK SAYS IT IS SUMMERS

Roseburg, Nov. 25.—With the testimony of G. R. Sperlock, sheriff of Throckmorton, Texas, introduced at the continued hearing in this city yesterday, the state rested its case against Rev. George Clark, a Methodist minister of Gardiner, who is resisting extradition to Throckmorton on the indictment charging George Clark Summers with obtaining money under false pretenses. Sperlock positively identified the accused man as Summers and corroborated every bit of material evidence that had previously been introduced. The officer when he was stationed at Throckmorton, and was intimately acquainted with the minister.

Rev. T. B. Ford, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Pendleton, has been subpoenaed by the defense as a witness and is expected to arrive here Wednesday. By Rev. Mr. Ford the defense expects to show that there are two Rev. Mr. Summers in Texas at one time, and that the accused man is a victim of mistaken identity. Circumstances are so clearly against the defendant, however, that the magistrate before whom the hearing is being conducted saw fit to increase the minister's bond from \$500 to \$1000, in default of which he was locked up in the county jail. This increase in the bond angered Attorney W. W. Cardwell, of the defense, and he engaged in a wordy tilt with the court, resulting in his being adjudged in contempt and fined \$25.
