

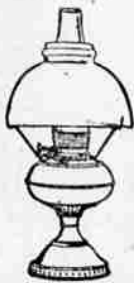

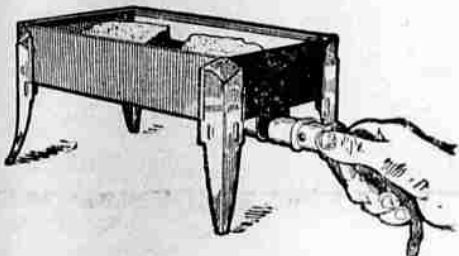

SPRINGFIELD LETS CONTRACT FOR CEMENT WALKS

At the regular meeting of the city council Friday night the bids for the construction of sidewalks, curbs and gutters between Mill and Second streets and between Fifth and Seventh streets on Main, were opened and read after being carefully considered. Upon motion the contract was awarded Beadle & Noble. Gus Myers, of Eugene, had the former contract and also bid on this work. He has nearly completed his contract and so far as we are able to see has done a good job but lost out on the contract on account of his figures being higher than those of Beadle & Noble. The work of building the walk between Second and Mill will be started at once or as soon as the weather permits, but the other two blocks will not be built till spring because the ground is low making it almost impossible to do the work on account of so much standing water. The successful contractors are residents of Springfield, coming here from Michigan about a year ago. They have done some cement work here, most of their work during the past year has been in Eugene. Both gentlemen have been doing finishing work for the largest contractors in Eugene and from what we learn are first class mechanics.

Within another week it is probable that two real estate deals will be made in Springfield Main street property, which will ultimately result in the addition of two fine store buildings. One it is understood will be a two story brick and the other made of concrete. They will both have a frontage of 60 feet or more and will be erected in the early spring.

C. W. Semmes was in Springfield Tuesday in the interest of the Eugene Guard. He was also hustling for new carriers for the daily as Frank Castele, who has been delivering the paper to the subscribers here has decided to quit on account of bad weather.

Mr. A. S. Nickerson, who was taken to Portland for hospital accommodations was successfully operated upon and his friends here will be glad to know that a speedy recovery is expected. Several of our new citizens went to Eugene last Saturday forenoon to take the civil service examination for the rural free delivery. They were trying for the route made vacant by the resignation of M. C. Davis, who has been carrying the mail on route No. 1 for the past several years. We are informed that four from Springfield took the examination but as Uncle Sam has employment for but one of the four, disappointment surely awaits the others.

Warrants of arrest were issued by the recorder on a complaint sworn to by the marshal, Monday, wherein two of the pool hall proprietors were arrested for keeping their pool hall open and their tables running on Sunday which is contrary to Ordinance No. 49. Upon a plea of guilty they were assessed the minimum fine which was \$5 and costs.—News.
