THREE LITTLE BOYS FREEZE TO DEATH

Ventura, Nov. 28.—Frozen to death in snow that covers the high peaks north of the Santa Clara valley. Wednesday night, the bodies of three Santa Paula boys were found late today after a search of two days. The boys, Clifford Sharp, 17; Cuba Sharp, 9 and John Bies, 13, started out Thursday morning to see the snow. They went without coats intending to be home in time for Thanksgiving dinner. When night came and they had not returned, the community was notified but nothing could be done until daylight. Friday morning searching parties were organized, everybody joining, even to two gangs of Japanese laborers, and the search was kept up all day. Today Henry Newman and W. Hamlin found the bodies at the head of Timber Canyon, ten miles from Santa Paula. The boys had evidently gotten into deep snow, became exhausted and perished from cold and hunger. The fathers of the boys are well-known ranchers.

CHEMAWA DEFEATS ALBANY HIGH SCHOOL

The Chemawa second football team defeated the Albany High school yesterday afternoon on the Chemawa gridiron, 12 to 0. The Indians used the forward pass and quarterback kicks for gains and went through the Albany line repeatedly. Two minutes after play the Indians pushed one of Albany's backs over the line for a safety. Then by a series of forward passes and line bucks Scott was pushed over the line. The goal was missed. In the second half the Indians attempted the forward pass and were penalized several times. Then they resorted to outside kicks, punting and runs and bucking the line. Williams, E., made the sensational play of the day. On the 25-yard line the signal was given for an outside kick. Williams took the ball, made feint of kicking but seeing an open field, plunged forward for a twenty-five yard run over the line for the last touchdown. —Salem Statesman.
