ANOTHER ATHLETIC CHAMPIONSHIP MEET OPENS IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 30.—With an entry list comprising many of the leading college and club athletes of both the East and West, the indoor championships of the Amateur Athletic Union beginning in Madison Square Garden tonight promise to be one of the most successful athletic affairs ever held in this city.

The program, on which twenty-three events are listed, has been split into two sections. Tonight the 75-yard dash, 300 and 1000-yard run, two-mile, 220-yard hurdles, standing broad jump, throwing 56-pound shot for height, putting 8-pound shot, pole vault for distance, running hop, step and jump, running high jump and the one-mile walk will be decided. Tomorrow's program will be the 60-yard dash, 160 and 600-yard run, five mile run, 300-yard hurdles, standing high jump, three standing broad jumps, putting 24-pound shot, pole vault for height, and three-mile walk.

Most of the Eastern athletes who won fame at Athens and London will compete, and many champions from out of town will be on hand. It is predicted that the Westerners may cut quite a figure in the results. The Chicago A. A. has sent a strong team of championship calibre. The athletic clubs of Montreal, Boston, Baltimore and several other cities will also be represented in the meet by their star performers.

OREGON WELL REPRESENTED ON ALL-NORTHWEST

Clarke, Moullen, Pinkham and Dodson Are Credited With Place

Four University of Oregon players are credited with places on the All-Northwest football team by the Oregonian and three by the Oregon Journal. C. N. McArthur, of the Oregonian, gave Dodson, who has played such a brilliant style in Portland, the left end position, and Robert A. Cronin gave the place to Savage, of Idaho, at the same time mentioning Dodson for his brilliant work.

The men as they made the coveted honor team are Moullen, guard; Clarke, fullback; Pinkham, left tackle, and Dodson, left end. Wolf, of the O. A. C., plays a half back position, and Mucklestone, of Washington, the other back. Coyle, of Washington, is admitted by all as the logical man for quarter. Jamison, of O. A. C., is given a tackle, over Eakin, the big Washington freshman, and Grimm, of Washington, is generally chosen for end. Cronin also gives a halfback position to Borleske, of Whitman.

Who Will Captain Team?

Dudley Clarke is likely to become captain of the eleven next year.

Pinkham also is a strong candidate for that position, but as Dudley is a backfield man, and much of the time this year was field captain, he apparently stands the best chance.

Coach Forbes is almost certain to be chosen coach again, if he will accept. While at the first of the season it was considered likely that he could be retained here, the opinion now prevails that he will consent to another contract.

In case Forbes should decline the headship of the University coaching forces next year, 'Ole' Arnsperger has been spoken of as a coming man. He is versatile in his own playing, and from the way he handled the second team this year, would use excellent judgment in the production of a team. In any case he is likely to be retained as assistant for next year, if he will consent. Otherwise Fred Moullen Moullen may be given the job, as he is not likely to graduate until next year, and will be barred from playing under the four-year rule.

Oregon will lose this year by the four-year rule and by graduation Moullen, right tackle and captain, and McIntyre, fullback and guard.

RIGHT-OF-WAY AGENT FOR OREGON EASTERN IN EUGENE AGAIN

Major Edwards Here to Finish Up Some Matters Connected with New Line

Major Edwards, right-of-way agent for the Oregon Eastern railway, the Harman line which is projected from Eugene over the Cascades and through Klamath Falls to Weed, Cal., is in the city again, having arrived Saturday from San Francisco. When seen by a reporter this morning the major stated that the object of his visit here at this time is to finish up a few small unsettled matters concerning the right of way for the line. He expects to be here about a week. While he is not in a position to state positively, Major Edwards thinks that construction work on the new railway will begin early next year.

FAMOUS OIL CASE GOES TO SUPREME COURT OF NATION

Washington, Nov. 30.—Another step in the government-suit against the Standard Oil Company of Indiana goes on record today, when the counsel for the government applies to the supreme court for a writ of certiorari, thus bringing the famous rebate case before the highest tribunal. This is the case in which the court of appeals reversed Judge Landis' fine of \$29,240,000 against the corporation.

The government in its petition for a writ of certiorari advances as its principal prayer the importance of the interpretation by the supreme court of the United States of certain clauses in the railroad rebate law. It is pointed out that several sections of the Elkins law are not sufficiently explicit in view of the conflicting court decisions and that the court of last resort should for the benefit of all concerned take jurisdiction of the case and give a construction which will be final and binding upon all inferior courts.

The officials of the department of justice who are most closely identified with the Standard Oil suit have found upon an examination that the supreme court refuses to grant writs of certiorari in cases decided by the United States circuit courts of appeal unless the questions at issue involve the interpretation of the constitutionality of the law. The government contends that under the rule filing one circuit court of appeals may place one construction upon it, and another court in another circuit a conflicting construction, and that it is possible that nine different constructions may come from the nine circuits. The complications that could arise have been used for their full effect in the petition of the government and the officials of the department of justice are confident that the court will grant the request for a construction of the law.
