SAYS WATER BOARD ORDINANCE NOT IN FORCE

City Attorney Says Ordinance Is Not in Effect for Thirty Days

At an adjourned meeting of the city council last evening the matter of turning over the city water plant to the newly appointed commission was brought up and it was found that there is no commission for the reason that the ordinance creating it is not in force. There was an emergency clause in the ordinance, but it was found after it was passed that the supreme court has held that all ordinances except those effecting the public health of the city or of a character demanding immediate action shall not take effect until 30 days after their passage and signing by the mayor. If an emergency clause is attached a three-fourths vote is necessary. There were only five votes out of eight cast for this ordinance. According to that, City Attorney Bean holds that the ordinance is not in effect. He has not investigated the matter thoroughly but will do so and report at the next meeting of the council.

Other Matters.
The matter of collecting pasturage for cows on the Skinner Butte property was brought up. The mayor reported that D. T. Gilman agrees to keep all fences in repair, collect pasturage and turn same over to the city treasurer for 20 cents per head per month. The matter was referred.

The city attorney reported that the franchise of the gas company requires them to file a report of their gross earnings January 1 of each year, and they shall pay into the city treasury one-half of one per cent of the same. He stated that it had not been done last year and should be looked after this year. The matter was referred to the finance committee.

The meeting adjourned until next Monday evening.

DEATH OF GRANDPA CASTEEL AT SPRINGFIELD

Milton Casteel was born in Steubenville, Ohio, June 7, 1832, and died at the home of his son, Elijah, in Springfield, Nov. 28, 1908, from heart failure, at the age of 76 years, 5 months and 21 days. October 22, 1850, he was united in marriage to Nancy Bonham, and to this union was born three children, all of whom are now living. Elijah of Springfield, Mrs. Freer of Airlie and Mrs. Siner of Portland. The deceased is an old pioneer having come to Oregon in 1853 and has since made his home here. Only a few short days ago he was about town and feeling well as could be for a man of his years but now another name has been stricken from the ever lessening roll of our old settlers and a solitary woman in the sunset of life, and a journey home, are left to attest how sadly they will miss him. For 58 years the dear old couple had lived happily together, but now death has parted them and those tender human ties cannot be severed without a pang.

Grandpa Casteel, was a man who united sound sense with a strong conviction, and a candid, outspoken temper, eminently fitted to mind the rude elements of pioneer society into form and consistency, and aid in raising a high standard of citizenship in our young and growing state, a man who valued his word and honor above all sacrifice to maintain it. He was a kind husband and father, a splendid neighbor and a loyal citizen.

Besides his aged companion and children, a number of grandchildren, a host of friends and neighbors will mourn his demise. The funeral services will be held at the residence of his son Monday, Dec. 30, at 2 p. m., conducted by Rev. E. J. Emmons. The body was interred in the Springfield O. P. cemetery.—Springfield News.

LIBERTY BELL MAY COME TO PORTLAND

Governor Chamberlain has gone east to make an endeavor to secure for the Rose Festival in June the Liberty Bell which is Philadelphia's most valued of heirlooms.

Of course that is not the only or the chief object of the governor's trip, but it is one of the many things he has in mind to attend to before he returns to Oregon. At the headquarters of the Rose Festival association this morning, it was stated that Governor Chamberlain will stop in Philadelphia to see Governor Stewart and members of the city council of the Pennsylvania metropolis, and will urge that the bell be allowed to make the trip to the coast to give the people of the western part of the United States an opportunity to see it.

An ordinance passed by a former city council of Philadelphia forbids the Liberty Bell being removed from that city, but it is hoped that the present municipal body can be induced to rescind this law and permit of the bell being made one of the principal features of Portland's big show.—Journal.
