## PROHIBIT KILLING CHINESE PHEASANTS FOR TWO YEARS

New Game Law Being Framed for Introduction at Next Session of Legislature

Officers of the Oregon Fish and Game Association will propose extensive amendments to the existing game laws of the state at the coming session of the Legislature. A committee, representing the Association, of which A. E. Gebhardt is secretary, is revising the various sections of the code with reference to the protection of fish and game. It is the purpose of the committee to simplify the state's statutes on this subject so that the average citizen by reading the law will be able to place an intelligent construction on its provisions.

"The committee expects in about two weeks to complete the first draft of the law as we will seek to have it amended," said Mr. Gebhardt yesterday. "We are taking considerable pains and devoting a great deal of our time that laws which will protect our fish and game may be formulated for the consideration of the state's lawmakers. A mistaken impression prevails that those laws in the past have been framed in the interest of the city sportsman exclusively rather than for the protection of the fish and game. In its work the committee is doing everything in its power to dissipate that idea. What is needed in this state is legislation that will protect and multiply the state's fish and game regardless of any self-interest. What is more it is the intention of the committee to suggest uniform laws that shall apply in all counties alike. Endless confusion we find has resulted from the laws as they are now constituted from the fact that different restrictions are imposed in practically every county of the state."

In response to a general demand alike from the hunters and the farmers, the committee will recommend a law establishing a closed season of at least two years for the protection of the Chinese pheasant. Another law will be suggested prohibiting the killing of elk for a period of five or six years.

The Legislature also will be asked to provide for a bounty fund on crows, wolves and cougars. Between crows and the animals named it is asserted by members of the committee that more birds and other game are killed annually than by the sportsmen. It is for that reason the committee believes the state should make provision for this sort of protection. Under the present law the county courts are empowered, if deemed expedient, to provide such a bounty fund, but the members of the committee feel that the expense should be borne by the state directly rather than by any one county or group of counties since the benefits following such a policy are state-wide and not confined to the community in which such a tax is levied.—Oregonian.

## IMPROVEMENTS IN TELEPHONE SERVICE

Local Exchange and General System Being Re-built

J. W. Gilkyson, division traffic superintendent of the Pacific States Telegraph and Telephone Co., was in the city this week, leaving for the north on the noon train. His mission here was to study the local telephone situation with a view to making improvements in the system and service, beyond those already under way. The company is now expending an appropriation of \$21,000 in outside improvements in Eugene, and Superintendent Gilkyson informs the Guard that he has been instructed to plan inside improvements that will call for at least as large a sum of money. It is the intention to place a modern switchboard in the central office like that which has been installed in Portland, and suitable for the needs of the city for twenty years in the future, dating from 1910. In the meantime additional switchboards, like those now in use, will be added to keep pace with the improvements under way on the outside.

The company is also arranging for extensive improvements on the long distance lines, making such valley cities as Eugene, Albany and Salem clearing houses for all local business, instead of having branch lines cut in on the main long distance wires, as is now the case. This will call for the stringing of new wires through the valley, and virtually a reconstruction of the system. When this work is completed in accordance with the plans, which Mr. Gilkyson showed the Guard representative, no patron should at any time be compelled to wait over ten minutes for any long distance call, and will generally be able to secure immediate service.

All these improvements will be carried out just as rapidly as it is possible to do the work, which should have been well under way now but for the financial fiasco of a year ago.
