WILLIAMS FINED FIVE HUNDRED FOR SELLING LIQUOR
 No Jail Sentence Imposed Upon Recommendation of District Attorney

John Williams, who had previously been indicted for selling beer in violation of the local option law, this afternoon appeared in court and changed his plea of not guilty to that of guilty. Upon recommendation of the district attorney Judge Harris did not impose a jail sentence, but imposed a fine of \$500.

Shell Coffman pleaded guilty this afternoon to the same charge and was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$150.

Bert Kelsay, indicted for perjury, was arraigned and time for entering a plea was set for tomorrow at 9 a. m.

Pony Witter, charged with selling liquor, entered a plea of guilty this morning and time for sentence was set at 9 a. m. Wednesday.

Cyrus Woolridge, charged with the same offense, was arraigned. He will enter a plea tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. F. M. DeNeffe was appointed to defend him.

The case of the state vs. Charles Mayhew, also charged with violating the local option law, was discharged for want of prosecution.

The trial jurors reported for duty again this morning and will sit in several cases this week. The first case to come up was that of C. P. Houston, administrator of the estate of M. J. Houston, deceased, vs. W. C. Hembree, to recover money. The following jury was chosen: E. L. Gum, J. S. Ham, Jas. Humphrey, T. A. Gilbert, Geo. A. Dyson, E. E. Ahwrey, G. H. Bogue, W. J. Canady, O. W. Brabham, L. M. Tozier, Otho Roberts and Wm. A. Seymour.
