JOE JACOBS ONCE MORE GETS THE MAXIMUM SENTENCE

Judge Harris Keeps His Word—The Two Witters and Smyth Sentenced

Joe Jacobs, the Charnelton street merchant who a few days ago was given the maximum sentence of 30 days in jail and a fine of \$500 for violating the local option law and is now serving the sentence in the county jail, was again given the limit by Judge Harris in the circuit court this morning, he having pleaded guilty to a second indictment against him. This makes fines aggregating \$1000 against him and he will have to serve sixty days in jail.

Aged Man Fined \$250.
Charles J. Witter, who formerly ran a saloon in Eugene, later being engaged in the same business at Springfield and afterward running a "blind pig" there, according to his plea of guilty entered this morning, was arrested last evening on the charge of violating the local option law. He was brought up for sentence this morning at 10 o'clock. Judge Harris stated that inasmuch as Witter had gone out of the business and had been out since last April and as he was neither directly or indirectly interested in the business at the present time and on account of his old age—76 years—he was inclined to be lenient and fixed his fine at \$250. Witter stated to the judge that he was entirely out of the business and expected to stay out. As he accompanied his attorney, L. Billeu, out of the courtroom, he burst into tears, eliciting the sympathy of the onlookers. Witter was always a law-abiding citizen as a saloon-keeper but, like many others in the same business, he kept on selling liquor after the local option law went into effect.

Smyth Fined \$300.
W. H. Smyth, who had entered a plea of guilty to the charge of selling liquor in Eugene, was sentenced this forenoon to pay a fine of \$300. Pony Witter, son of Charles Witter, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail on the same charge.

Bert Kelsay, charged with perjury, withdrew his plea of not guilty this morning and entered a plea of guilty. He will be sentenced Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

Grand Jury Quits Till February.
The grand jury last evening reported to the court that it had not finished the business before it and had adjourned till Monday, February 5, at 9 a. m. There are a number of liquor cases yet to be looked into.

Parsons Jury Disagreed.
The jury in the Zach Parsons liquor case reported last night that it could not agree and was discharged. It is said the vote stood 7 to 5 for acquittal. A jury in another case against Parsons was secured this forenoon as follows:

Thomas Linn, a former restaurant keeper here, was arrested this morning upon an indictment charging him with booze-selling, and he was at once arraigned. He will enter his plea tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.
