SHOPLIFTER IS ARRESTED BUT TURNED LOOSE

Mrs. Mary Sharp, whose home is at Cottage Grove, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Chief of Police Farrington while she was at Otto's confectionery store, being suspected of shoplifting. When searched, a number of articles which had been reported stolen by different merchants were found on her person. She stoutly denied her guilt until the articles were identified and then she admitted that she took them. She had the following articles: a silk scarf from S. H. Dunn's; a remnant of silk from S. H. Dunn's store; a purse from Mrs. Fisher's; a belt and a remnant of ribbon. Only a part of these things were found by the police, but a lady deputy searched the woman's undergarments and found the remainder. The total value of the things found is probably more than \$10. She also had \$22.50 in money in one of her stockings.

Mrs. Sharp was taken before Justice of the Peace Bryson. He sentenced her to 60 days in the county jail, but suspended sentence with the understanding that, if she is caught again the sentence will be much heavier and she will have to serve it out. She is a widow and has four children, and this had a good deal to do with the judge's leniency. Attorney J. M. Williams says this is the same woman who was caught at shoplifting in a store at Albany several months ago. At that time she resided at Halsey. There have been other small cases of shoplifting in several stores lately. Only last night a 13-year-old girl was caught taking an article off the counter at Hill's gun store. After taking her name and address Mr. Hill let her go, but warned her that she would be arrested if caught again.

Bourne Secures His Appointment as Postmaster

Washington, Dec. 9—John C. Young, private secretary of Senator Bourne, has been nominated by President Roosevelt for postmaster of Portland. The president's recommendation was sent to the senate today. The announcement created a sensation, as Washington had been hearing conflicting reports as to the status of Senator Bourne at the White House. Young received many congratulations from friends here. He refused to discuss the political significance of the nomination. As soon as the news was made public, inquiry was made as to any possibility of opposition developing. Only Senator Fulton's opposition could prevent the confirmation of Young, as no other senator has any interest in the matter.

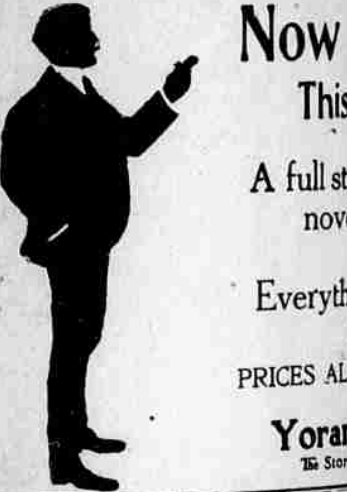
