Five hoboes were run in last night and given a job of scraping mud off the pavement this morning. Free Thomas has just completed plans for a 6-room cottage for Mr. Rae, the second hand man, and which will be built on West Eighth street. The ladies' aid society of the Congregational church will hold an Apron sale at Finn's Drug store on December 15. Von and Hennessy have bought the restaurant, belonging to George Williams at 627 Willamette street, and will conduct the business in the

future as a model establishment of its class. The pressed brick work on the Hovey block is completed. The cornice work and the fire wall are now being put in. All the trial jurors except T. A.
