The convention of the Oregon State Dairy Association at Salem last week was the most successful ever held by that body, Washington and California were represented in both attendance and exhibits. The grand prize for the best display of dairy products was awarded to F. A. Schubinger, of Salem, for an exhibit comprising twenty-six varieties of cheese. The Douglas Creamery Company, of Roseburg, won first award for highest scoring creamery butter, F. G. Mantke, of Sweet Home, for the highest scoring dairy butter, and T. J. Ballantine, of Hobsonville, for the highest scoring cheese. The dairymen pledged a fund of \$150 per month for the employment of an expert to bring dairy conditions throughout the state up to the highest possible standard. An appropriation of \$6000 will be asked

from the legislature. President F. L. Kent, of Corvallis, was re-elected, with Carl Abrams, of Salem, as secretary. The time of next year's meeting will be chosen to harmonize with the date selected by the Washington dairymen, who meet at Chehalis this week. C. L. Mitchel, of the dairy division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, is in Chehalis for this meeting.

 1775—British under Lord Dunmore defeated by Americans at Norfolk, Va.
 1788—Charles III, of Spain, whose war against England helped the United States in the Revolution, died. Born January 20, 1716.

 1855—Joel Abbott, commanding the American squadron in the East Indies, died at Hong Kong.
 1861—The prince consort, husband of Victoria, died. Born August 26, 1816.
 1864—General Dix ordered reprisals on Canadians because of the St. Albans raid; order annulled later by President Lincoln.
 1873—Louis J. A. Agassiz, celebrated naturalist, died at Cambridge, Mass. Born May 20, 1807.
 1876—Destructive fire at Little Rock.
 1891—Sir Oliver Mowat, liberal prime minister of Ontario, issued an address declaring vigorously against American assimilation.

Albert E. Mead
 Albert Edward Mead, governor of the state of Washington, was born at Manhattan, Kas., December 14, 1861. His education was received in the public schools of Kansas, Iowa and Illinois, and in the Southern Illinois Normal School. He studied law in Chicago and was admitted to the bar in Kansas, where he practiced from 1885 to 1889. In the latter year he removed to the state of Washington and opened a law office in the town of Blaine. He took an active part in Republican politics and in 1892 and 1893 served as mayor of his adopted town. He afterward served a term in the Washington house of representatives, and another as county attorney of Whatcom county. Four years ago he was elected governor of the state for the term that will expire next month.
