## MATHEWS MAY HAVE BEEN LED TO DEATH BY WOMEN

Sheriff Bown Investigating Matrimonial Bureau Experience of Dead Man

The following is from the Portland Journal, concerning the mystery surrounding the death of Jacob Mathews, who was found in the cabin on the Walker place a week ago Sunday:

Made acquainted with a strange woman by a local matrimonial bureau, or introducing bureau, as it is advertised, Jacob Mathews left Portland a few days ago and went down to Lane county to meet the woman. Last Saturday night he was found dead in a lonely cabin in that county and now it is believed he was poisoned.

Mathews, who is an old man, is said to have had some money, which was probably why he was murdered. It is not yet known who is the woman suspected of complicity in the poisoning nor has the name of the matrimonial bureau yet been ascertained. Sheriff Bown of Lane county is in Portland today endeavoring to find out these things, and has called upon local police to help him.

There are several of these bureaus in Portland, the ostensible object of which is to bring together fond hearts which beat alone and to promote matrimony, but it is said that some of them have drifted away from their original purpose and will introduce one to any person he desires to meet, asking no questions.

It is suspected that Mathews fell into the hands of some of these sharpers and was betrayed by a woman to his death.

## MORE ACTIVITY PROMISED AMONG LANE SAWMILLS

Booth-Kelly Mill At Wendling Will Resume First of New Year

Geo. H. Kelly, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., informs the Guard that the company's big mill at Wendling, will resume operations immediately after the first of January and will continue to operate steadily thereafter. The plant has been completely overhauled during the past few months and is now in excellent shape. New machinery has been installed and the mill is now more modern than ever before. The new logging railroad leading from Wendling up the Mohawk valley for five or six miles has been completed and all that it needs to make it as good as any piece of railroad in the state is the ballasting. The road taps a splendid body of timber. Logs from the tract will be hauled to the mills at Wendling, Springfield and Coburg.

There is a general belief that the Southern Pacific's mills at Marcola will open up again in the early spring. If they do, it will mean that financial conditions in this county will be better than new, although Eugene and Lane county never were affected to any extent by the recent panic.
