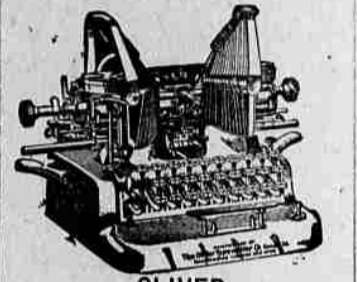
## BASKETBALL SCHEDULE FOR W. O. I. A.

Debaters Chosen for the Interstate Teams  
Charles Sievers, the best cross-country runner in the college, and one of the best all-around distance men, has left the University and will not take part in the track meets during the coming season. Sievers lives near Portland, and while he entered college at the first of the year, he has been obliged to stop on account of the expense, which he was not able to meet.  
**Debaters Chosen.**  
Eight men to debate against Washington and Idaho were chosen last Saturday. Earl Kilpatrick and Thomas R. Townsend, two of the most experienced men in college, and generally considered as leaders, did not enter preliminary, and therefore of the eight only two old men of last year's class are eligible. They are J. H. Bond and W. C. Nicholas. The other of the eight are: Robinson, Lyons, Collier, Ray, Gammans and Cash.  
Instead of three men composing the team this year, there will be four. Coach Elliott expects to make the fourth, usually known as an alternate, work with the three regular men and take part in the debate. Thus, four men will go to Moscow, Idaho, instead of three.
