HORSETHIEF PANDER
WANTED TO GO TO
PENITENTIARY TODAY
Asked to Be Allowed to Plead Guilty So He Could Go to Salem on the Morning Train

Deputy Sheriff George Croner returned last night from Canyonville, Douglas county, where Al Pander and E. C. Hasse, charged with the theft of a team and buggy from Tom Bailey's livery stable in Eugene, had been arrested by City Marshal Cardwell, of Canyonville. The men were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Bryson this forenoon. Pander, who hired the rig with the ostensible object of going to Elmira but ran away with it, waived examination and was bound over to appear for trial in the circuit court. He wanted to plead guilty and be sentenced so he could go to the penitentiary on this morning's train, but he was told that he would have to wait till circuit court convenes.

Hasse, who claims to have been overtaken on the road by Pander, will be given an examination as soon as Bailey returns with the rig. It is highly probable that he will be discharged from custody as it appears that he is in no way connected with the theft of the outfit. Pander traded one of the horses, a white mare, to a man near London Springs, on his way south and Bailey will stop there on his way home to get it. Pander is also charged with stealing a shotgun at Junction City and selling it at Irving for \$11.
