SEVEN-MILL TAX VOTED FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

The annual meeting of the Eugene school district was held at the high school last night. A seven-mill tax was voted for school purposes in the district for the coming year.

It was the sense of the meeting that additional warrants or bonded indebtedness to the amount of \$40,000 be incurred with which to pay for the addition to the high school building and to erect an additional building for school purposes, and on motion the school board was instructed to call a meeting with that end in view.

Chairman Cheshire, of the school board, submitted his report, which was a review of the school year, and showed the enrollment had increased from 1400 in 1904 to 1700 at the present time, while the monthly payroll of teachers and janitors had increased from \$1500 to \$3200. High school teachers now draw \$70 per month; the grade teachers \$55, and the principal of the high school, \$1,200 per annum; principals of the grades, \$90. The assessed valuation of the district is \$5,654,975. He pointed out the \$15,000 voted at the last election was not issued, owing to the high rate of interest, and it was recommended that a meeting of taxpayers of the district should be called by petition in the near future for the purpose of voting bonds, not to exceed \$40,000, to repay the general fund for real estate purchased, buildings erected, and also to build at least one additional grade building. The report was adopted.
