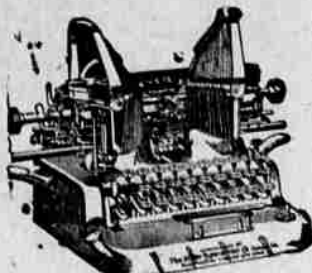

THURSTON VOTES A SPECIAL ROAD TAX

(Special Correspondence.) Thurston, Dec. 23.—There has not been at any state or presidential election that the people have contested the issue so spirited as at the special tax election held on last Saturday. The vote first was on, "shall we fix the road, commencing at High Bank and going east?" The vote carried by a big majority. The estimate on the parts mentioned was \$435. It would require a three-mill tax, so the vote was taken and the result was a majority of nine over all opposition, allowing two votes under challenge opposed to the tax. After the adjournment, Mr. Platt called order and stated that inasmuch as a full attendance was present, it would be a good time to get a fair expression as to the choice of the district for road supervisor the coming year and moved that Father Lutton be the chairman. It was so voted and Mr. Ruth acted as secretary. The chair appointed Mr. Platt and Mr. Donaldson as tellers. There were some eight different persons named by ballot, then it was moved that the three first names be taken as the candidates, and the second ballot was taken. Mr. Ford, Charles Gray and Gray were the contestants. Ira Gray having received a majority over all, was declared the persons to be the one recommended and the chairman was instructed to so present the same to the county committee.

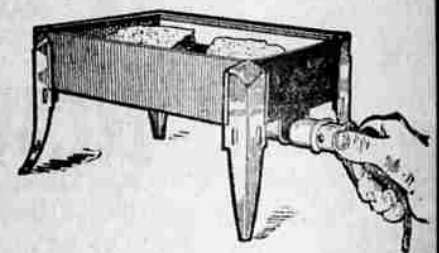
