COUNCIL REFUSES ATT'Y BEAN'S RESIGNATION

Attorney J. M. Pipes Appointed Assistant to Help With Suit Against the City

The city council decided at a meeting Thursday afternoon that the services of Louis Bean as city attorney are indispensable, and refused to accept his resignation. To lighten the duties of the city attorney, while he is in legislature and at other times, J. M. Pipes was appointed as an assistant.

Attorney Pipes stated that the fees for the conduct of the injunction suit through the circuit and supreme courts would be \$500. In the circuit court alone they would amount to \$300.

To pay the interest on the water bonds \$5,000 was appropriated from the general fund, to be paid January 1st. The transfer of \$6,000 was ordered withdrawn from the water fund to the general fund.

The council meets again Monday night.

SEVENTY-FIVE BASE BALL PLAYERS SIGN ON UNIVERSITY SQUAD

Lee Hurd Is Captain and Ormond Bean Manager of the Big Squad

Seventy-five baseball men have signed up at the university for winter and spring practice, as the result of Captain Lee Hurd's enthusiasms. From this number the team will be chosen to try for the Northwest championship and perhaps to take a trip to Japan.

The chances for places are unusually good.

Of last year's baseball team there is a good nucleus of four or five men in Charles, Coleman, Henke, Erskine, and several others. Of the new men there will be at least Karl King and two pitchers who are entitled to particular consideration in calculating the line-up.

Ormond Bean is manager of the team and according to custom the team will probably take one big trip during the spring vacation, with several other jaunts of one or two days duration. The week schedule is the hardest part of the season, the strain on pitchers being very severe. The early season, when cold weather is always threatening, makes it hard for the best of men to keep rounded into shape.

The University students want a professional coach. Last year the four O. A. C. baseball games were lost chiefly because of the absence of a professional head, and naturally the students do not want to see the feat repeated.
