Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 30.—Fight followers in Los Angeles and vicinity are looking forward to a slugging contest at the Jeffries club tonight when the two giant heavyweights, Al Kaufman of California and Jimmy Barry of Chicago, come together for a battle that is expected to draw a tremendous interest in the fight is evidenced by a lively demand for tickets today.
