ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING BEING HELD TODAY

Organization Enjoys Most Prosperous Year in Its Entire History

The annual meeting of the First Christian church was held at the church building today. The congregation gathered at 10:30 a. m. to listen to an excellent New Year sermon by the pastor, Rev. J. S. McCallum, and after the services a basket dinner was served to several hundred members present. The business meeting is being held this afternoon. Reports of officers and pastor were read and election of officers held. P. J. McPherson and C. R. Vanduyne were elected elders and O. M. Murphy and P. E. Snodgrass deacons.

The report of the pastor, which includes reports of other officers, showed that during the year 1907, the sum of \$10,374.52 was raised for missions and a total for all departments of \$14,441.53 was raised. The pastor paid 783 visits during the year, married 25 couples and officiated at 19 funerals. The number of additions to the church was 357 and others granted 31; there were 12 deaths in the membership, leaving a net increase of 324. The present membership is 1582 and the active enrollment 1000.

The reports showed that 1908 was by far the most prosperous year in the history of the organization.
