WORST DAY OF THE PRESENT WINTER

Warm Rain Turns to Snow and Meets—Freezing Weather Now Prevails

Today has been by far the worst day of the winter. Last night's warm rain turned to snow early this morning, and during a greater part of today a cold sleet has fallen, the thermometer during most of the time remaining near the freezing point.

Very little snow remained on the ground in Eugene, although reports from the country a few miles west indicate that several inches fell out there, and down the valley it is said, there was quite a heavy fall.

This weather is something like the silver thaw which occurred in Portland two or three years ago and which caused a great deal of damage to light and telephone wires and shade trees.

RELIGIOUS RIOTS QUELLED BY TROOPS

British Soldiers Fire Upon Angry Mob of Hindus

Calcutta, Jan. 4.—Religious riots between the Mohammedans and Hindus have taken a more serious turn, requiring the intervention of British troops today at Titagarh. The troops fired on the Hindus, who had attacked a mosque because the Mohammedans had sacrificed cows. They destroyed the sacred furniture and partially demolished the walls of the mosque, when the inflamed Mohammedans gathered in defense of the mosque and were surrounded by troops, which formed a barrier between the rival religionists. The Hindus assaulted the soldiers in an effort to get at the Mohammedans, compelling the soldiers to fire upon them.

GOVERNOR BRADY DELIVERS MESSAGE

Members of Legislature Pledge Heyburn's Re-election

Boise, Jan. 5.—Governor Brady delivered his first message today. He urged the enactment of a county local option law and direct primary law, and that the legislature keep its promise and re-elect Senator Heyburn. He disapproved of the creation of a railway commission, but was in favor of a public utilities commission to have supervision of all public service corporations. The governor asks for liberal appropriations for all state institutions, especially the State University. It was stated today that sufficient legislators had signed a paper pledging themselves to Senator Heyburn to insure his re-election.

PRESIDENT SIGNS BILL FOR RELIEF.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The President this afternoon signed the bill passed by congress, appropriating \$800,000 for the relief of the Italian earthquake sufferers.
