Meeting to Be Held Tuesday
Night to Consider Proper
Legislative Action

The following notice of public meet-
ing was handed The Guard for pub-
lication:

Through the courtesy, and by the
permission of the Eugene Commer-
cial Club, a public meeting is hereby
called, to be held at the Club Rooms
on Tuesday evening, January 12th,
at seven-thirty o'clock for the pur-
pose of the consideration of proper
and necessary legislation to be en-
acted at the coming session of the state
legislature, and suitable and suffi-
cient organization for the full and
adequate enforcement of such legis-
lation to be enacted for the purpose
of the protection and propagation of
the game and fish in the forests and
streams of the state of Oregon.

The creation of a game and fish
preserves of the Cascade forest reser-
vation, to the exclusion of all hun-
ters and rodmen, being contemplated
by the forestry department, the mat-
ters to be considered at such meet-
ing is of great importance to every
citizen of the city of Eugene and
Lane county. The questions so to be
considered are not in the interests
of sportsmen, further than the gen-
eral interests of all classes of Oregon
citizenship, and all are urgently re-
quested to attend.
