CORVALLIS WILL ASK LEGISLATURE FOR \$170,000

To ask for an appropriation of \$170,000 for new buildings and equipment at the coming legislature was decided upon at a meeting of the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural College last night at the Corvallis hotel. These improvements are absolutely necessary, the officials believe, owing to the crowded condition of the school.

The report of President Kerr, made last night, contains a full account of the work and conditions of the institution, and shows a remarkable growth during the last two years. The attendance last year was 1156, being an increase of 223 over the preceding year. The enrollment at present is between 1200 and 1300; and, including students who will enter next week for the six and eight weeks' course in agriculture, domestic science and art, and mechanic arts, the registration for this year will exceed 1400. The attendance represents all the counties of Oregon, 20 different states and two foreign countries.—Oregon Journal.

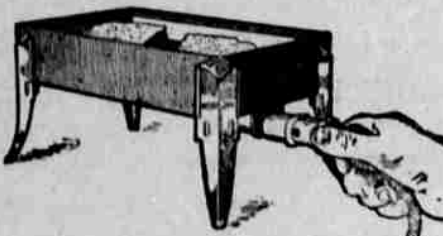

LAND GRANT CASE COMES UP MARCH 1

March 1 is the date set for the first clash between counsel for the railroad and attorneys for the government in the famous land grant suit of the United States against the Oregon & California Company, involving title to land in this state worth between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000, says the Portland Journal.

The time was set by Judge Wolverton in the United States circuit court this morning on motion of W. D. Fenton, representing the railroad company. Monday H. D. Townsend, special assistant to the attorney-general, who has had the case in hand for the government, made a motion asking that a date be set for the first hearing. At that time Judge Wolverton was unable to set an exact date, owing to the jury cases on the calendar. During the latter part of February all these cases will be disposed of, and Judge Wolverton, therefore, set the argument for March 1.

The hearing set down by Judge Wolverton this morning involves the argument of the demurrer filed by the railroad company to the charges set forth in the suit in equity brought by the government. Practically all of the legal points in the case will be brought up in the argument of this demurrer and the decision will virtually be final so far as the lower court is concerned.

Quite an array of legal talent will be in court representing the different interests in the case. For the railroad company there will be Peter F. Dunne, of San Francisco, general counsel for the Southern Pacific, William Singer, Jr., of San Francisco, and W. D. Fenton, of Portland. Associated with Mr. Townsend for the prosecution will be Tracy C. Becker, also a special assistant to the attorney-general.

Senator Gearin will appear for the Union Trust Company, of New York, trustees of the Oregon & California. In the event that the demurrer is overruled by the court Senator Gearin will answer the government's complaints; officials of the company having some time ago decided not to demur to the suit.
